CHOOSING BRIDES FOR TURKS
Marriage in Turkey is a very prosaic
affair. It being in a majority of cases
quite a business matter. When a man
wishes to wed, his parents obtain a list
of houses where eligible girls are to be
found, and the mother then calls at these.

"What can your daughter do?" she
asks, whereupon embroideries, carpets,
rugs, etc., are exhibited as evidence of
the girl's handwork. If these are ap-
proved by the mother, she takes the
goods home to her son and induces him
to marry the clever young woman.

It, on the other hand, she does not
think much of the work, she makes
some diplomatic excuse, and passes on
to another house on the list. If how-
ever, the young man is not liked by the
girl's parents, the mother is advised to
seek elsewhere.

In Sweden and Norway, a legal mar-
riage at one time was not allowed to be
solemnized until both parties had pro-
duced certificates stating that they bore
genuine vaccination marks.

Some of the older houses in Holland
have two doors, which are used for
marriages and deaths only. By one door
the bride and groom enter, and through
the other they are carried out when dead.

Cultivating Edible Bamboo.
The Japanese edible bamboo has been
successfully introduced into the south-
ern portion of the United States by the
department of agriculture. Several plan-
tations are now established in Georgia
and Louisiana. Popularization of the
bamboo will furnish large home-grown
supplies of this useful timber required
by our manufacturing industries.

The giant grass grows a foot a day, and its
50-foot stalk is well adapted for mak-
ing frames, furniture, ladders, trellises
and barrel hoops. The new growth is a
delicious vegetable and resembles aspara-
gus in flavor and in the manner of its
preparation. There is an increasing de-
mand in America for the bamboo tim-
ber, and also for the edible bamboo shoot.
