BRavery OF GIRLS SAVES TWO LIVES

Blanche Corliss Rescued by
Reta Lawrence in Lake Off
Oakville — Boy Off Dock
by Sisters.

Oakville, Ont., July 15.—The town dock here was very nearly the scene of two drowning fatalities. The first incident almost to result tragically occurred when Miss Blanche Corliss was rescued by Miss Reta Lawrence after she had sunk for the third time. Both girls, who are employees of the Bell Telephone Company, were in swimming when Miss Corliss was seized with a cramp. Although she was a considerable distance from shore and although the water was rough, her companion swam to her assistance and succeeded in effecting the rescue.

Just after supper time, six-year-old Harold Hopkins was playing with his sisters on the dock when he slipped on its edge and plunged into the water. The little girls, in spite of their screams which brought quick assistance, did not

DRAWN BY GIRL FROM PATH OF A TRAIN

Woodstock, Ont., July 15.—Cecil Young, aged 24, of this city, both deaf and dumb, was almost instantly killed when he walked into the path of an east-bound freight train while crossing the G.T.R. tracks five miles east of this city.

Young was thrown by the engine into the second track directly in the path of the Detroit Express, only a few hundred yards away. Miss Blanche Perry, a graduate of the Woodstock Hospital, spending her holidays at her home, only a few yards from the track, witnessed the accident, rushed out and pulled the unconscious man off the track just as the train rushed by.

Young was taken to the local hospital suffering from concussion of the brain and a severed right leg. All efforts to save his life were of no avail and he died two hours after entering the hospital.

EUNUCHS IN TURK HAREMS STRIKE FOR MORE MONEY

Constantinople, July 15.—Constantinople's harem attendants have gone on strike for more money and shorter hours. Many of the city's finest harems have been left unguarded, and their owners are trying distractedly to find suitable substitutes for the strikers. Numbers of Russian refugees have volunteered their services, but it was found that they were not adapted to the position.

The striking attendants insist that their "twenty-four hour day" and the unceasing vigil they are required to keep on the women of the harems, justify better remuneration, especially during the present hard times. Many of them protest that their salaries have not been paid for more than a year. The fact is that their masters, who in most cases are officials or employees of the government, have not drawn any salary for months. The strikers include the eunuch and other attendants.

ENGINEER SAVES FIFTEEN LIVES

Flags Fast Flyer in Nick of Time to Prevent Almost Certain Fatalities.

Brockville, July 15.—An incident reflecting great credit upon the railwaymen concerned and resulting in the possible saving of fifteen lives, is reported at Grand Trunk headquarters here.

Engineer Donald Ross was proceeding east in charge of the engine on an extra freight train, and, when crossing the bridge near Ste. Anne de Bellevue station, he noticed about fifteen people standing on the westbound track, watching the progress of a boat through the locks. There is no footpath on the bridge, which is solely for railway use.

Knowing that the westbound international limited, the Grand Trunk passenger flyer, was almost due, that its engineer would be unable to see them because of a curve in the opposite direction, and that the people themselves could not escape being struck, in view of the freight train on one track and the passenger train on the other, Engineer Ross, with rare presence of mind, succeeded in flagging the approaching flyer from his engine and attracting the notice of the engineer before any accident occurred.

Had it not been for the action of Engineer Ross all those who were trespassing on the bridge might have been killed, either by being struck by the flyer or being hurled into the river.

SMALL BOY HIDES LIGHTED CIGARETTE IN MAIL BOX

Chester, Pa., July 15.—Nine-year-old Jimmie Wilets is at liberty despite the fact that he dropped a lighted cigarette into a government mail box. He was smoking a cigarette on a street corner when a relative caught him. Jimmie, thinking to free himself from suspicion by destroying the evidence, dropped the butt into the convenient mail box, and a letter carrier caught him in the act. A few letters were scorched before the carrier could unlock the box, but as Jimmie promised never again to desecrate government property he was let off with a reprimand.

Bryson, Ont., July 15.—Messrs.
