### DIES OF GRIEF FOR FRIEND.

Shock of Rev. P. E. Reilly's Death Kills J. F. Dooley, Undertaker.

The Rev. Peter E. Reilly, pastor for the last fourteen years of St. Henry's R. C. church, Avenue C and Twenty-eighth street, Bayonne, N. J., died late Thursday night of apoplexy at the rectory, Avenue C and Thirtieth street,

that place, John F. Dooley, an undertaker and close friend of the priest, summoned to take charge of the body, was so grief-stricken that he fell unconscious in the room and died in an adjoining bedroom half an hour later of heart disease. Father Reilly was fifty years old and Mr. Dooley forty-eight.
