N. B. PHONE BOOTH A BUSY ONE.
One of the prettiest booths at the exhibition is that of the New Brunswick Telephone Company which is situated in the first side to the left as one comes in at the main entrance. The interior decor is in plain but charming, the walls being covered with green felt paneled off with narrow moulding painted white, which makes a very tasteful contrast. Across the front of the booth is built a fence, the top of which is lined with the large heavy trunk line transposition insulation used in stringing the heavy wires. Along one side is placed a display of all kinds and sizes of equipments for telephones, showing the various styles of instruments used, such as a home extension set, farm line, special wall set and intercommunicating set; a number of free boxes and cable cans are also shown as well as a line of the different kinds of cables, aerial and underground, from the small 25 pair cable to the thick four hundred. A number of photographs are shown at the front of the booth, showing the local office, the Fredericton, Moncton and St. Stephen branches. Situated at the rear are two private branch exchange boards in full operation. These supply the service for the phones throughout the exhibition buildings. Four operators and a supervisor are on the job day and night working in shifts. These exchanges are of the very latest design and the service rendered by this branch has been generally well received and has been much appreciated by the phone users in the buildings.
A clever invention known as a calculator graph is also shown. It is a device used for the purpose of correctly recording the time of long distance messages

POLICE CASE IS ON IN NEW YORK TODAY

New York, Sept. 6.—Rheinlander Waldo, New York's commissioner of police, was the first witness called to the stand today at the departmental trial of C. G. Hayes, a deposed police inspector, charged with making false statements concerning the commissioner.
Commissioner Waldo testified that he called before him on August 10 the various officers of the police department, including the late inspector Hayes, and that he had given an anonymous interview, published that day, to the effect that orders had been given by him (Waldo) that no disorderly houses should be raided without his instructions.
"Inspector Hayes then told me that he understood his orders were not to raid disorderly houses without specific instructions from me."
"Did you ever instruct Inspector Hayes to refrain from obtaining evidence against that character in any form whatsoever," Commissioner Waldo replied.
Montreal, Sept. 6.—Joseph Monet has issued a challenge to Henri Bourassa and to the editors of a French newspaper of Montreal to enter a debate with him on the subject of the Mammor College removal controversy. It is said that there is considerable feeling in the town over the college question and a large meeting is anticipated.
