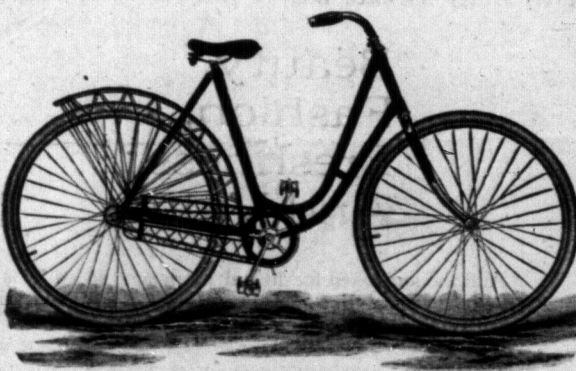

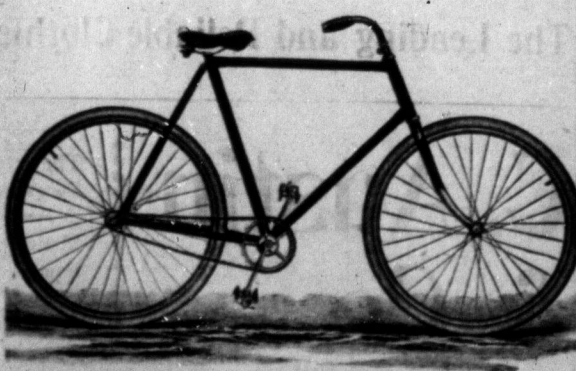

LABOR AND INDUSTRY

SOME ITEMS OF INTEREST TO UNION WORKMEN.

Tail Buildings Labor Saving—The Labor Press Must Be Maintained—How Prosperity strikes Our Exchanges—George's Legacy.

Land in parts of Paris and London is as costly as in New York and Chicago, but the fifteen story office building has never come into vogue here. While, on the other hand, buildings of ten or twelve stories are not uncommon in American cities of the second and third rank, where land is relatively cheap. The "sky-scraper" is a huge labor-saving and time-saving device.

Each building is almost a complete city, often comprising within its walls banks and insurance offices, postoffice and telephone exchange, and in taking advantage of the verandah of customers under the plea that custom and necessity compel them to adopt this course. The man who possesses the requisite business qualifications can succeed better by pursuing an honest, straightforward course, than if he were to deaden his conscience and disregard all moral obligations. We frequently hear the expression made in reference to some good natured, inactive man, "Oh, he's too honest to get along." Now this is a false inference, for in nine cases out of ten the honest man's failure does not arise from the practice of an upright course, but from his unfitness for the business in which he is engaged.

We do not by any means intend to convey the impression that honesty will cause a man who is not qualified for the business in which he engages to succeed. What we mean to assert, and the impression that we would leave on the minds of the readers of the Ledger is, that a man who is adapted to a certain pursuit will, and must necessarily succeed better by dealing honestly and uprightly than by evading and defrauding. But in addition to the matter of success, how cheerful and pleasant is the condition of the man who knows and feels that he is doing an honest business—a business which his conscience approves—New York Ledger.
