GOLCONDAS OF CANADA.

Bernard MacDonald's Plan For Finding Them-Government Should Explore the Rockies.

Bernard MacDonald, former manage of Le Ro: mine at Rossland, has deter nined upon a plan by which all the Rocky mountains within the confines of British Columbia are to be explored. says the New York Commercial. He believes that somewhere in these fastnesses are concealed Homestakes, Golcondas and Comstocks, merely awaiting the Canadian government, or some large corporation, should grub stake small parties of miners, and send them into every unexplored section of this big range. He asserts that the Rocky ntains beyond the Canadian border are consistently the same geological range that has yielded such fabulous profits in the United States.

"The United States, with 1,300 lineal illes of the Rockies," he says, "has produced \$4,500,000,000 in gold and silver in 33 years, or an average of about \$3,500,000 per lineal mile. Mexico, which has been working with primitive conditions for three centuries, has produced \$5,500,000,000, or a trifle more than \$3,500,000 per lineal mile. When it comes to the Canadian Rockies, which have been only slightly worked, the total production of gold and silver up to date is only \$166,000,000, or \$100,000 per lineal mile.
"Within Canadian territory the

Rockies have an approximate length of 1,600 miles by an average breadth of from 500 to 700 miles, and possess the premiums until January 1st, do in the southerly extension into American and Mexican territory. For this reason it is fair to assume that the Canadian Rockies will yield a quantity of about a salutary change.
