C. J. MILLIGAN IS REGISTRAR OF PROBATE. Vacant Position Filled at Gov't Meeting. Yesterday—George Robertson Says He is Not Disappointed.

The provincial government held a meeting in their rooms on Church street last Tuesday. Premier Tweedie, Attorney General Fugatey, Chief Commissioner Lavello, Hon. L. P. Farris and Solicitor General Jones were present.

The principal business transacted was the appointment of Charles J. Milligan to the position of registrar of probate. The local members, it is understood, waited upon the government and urged Mr. Milligan's claims to the position, and their views apparently prevailed.

The application of a number of companies for charters were granted, and will be gazetted in due course. The meeting adjourned to meet again this morning.

Yesterday afternoon Hon. L. P. Farris and Solicitor General Jones visited the Provincial House for the treatment of Nervous Diseases and made a thorough inspection of the institution. They found everything in first class order, and were entirely pleased with the results of the treatment.

The parents and the brother are overcome with grief at their loss, as she was the only girl and very bright for her age.

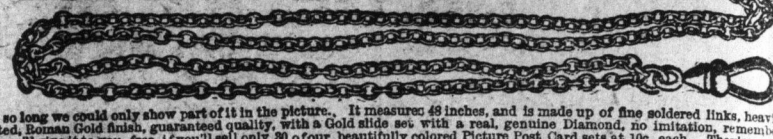
