

PLANNING TO CELEBRATE

To observe the Tercentenary of Beginning of Chartered Commerce. FESTIVITIES WILL LAST SIX MONTHS

Opens with Religious Service on March 22—Musical Festival as Form of Peace Celebration.

New York, Mar. 2.—It is announced as definitely decided that New York city will go ahead and celebrate this year.

Although the public has not yet been aroused to the celebration pitch, the date of commencement of festivities is almost at hand.

During April and May the celebration will be confined to commemorative exercises in the public schools.

The latter part of September will be given over to a series of parades. There will be a pageant of States.

The last named parade will be held in conjunction with the laying of a corner stone of a permanent memorial of some kind.

Interpersed in the programme are arrangements for various local features, including celebrations at all of the cities along the Erie Canal.
