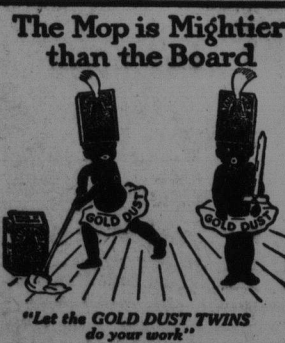

## PLAYGROUNDS TO OPEN IN THE EVENING

Arrangements announced  
at meeting of Community  
Council, last night—Sur-  
prised at opposition.

The members of the Community  
Council will endeavor to have the dif-  
ferent playgrounds about the city open-  
ed in the evening under the proper  
supervision if the necessary arrange-  
ments can be made. The executive of  
the Community Council met last evening  
with A. M. Belding in the chair and  
Mrs. W. F. Hatheway acting sec-  
retary.

Rev. A. J. Archibald reported that  
he had made arrangements for the  
Carleton grounds to be opened tonight  
under supervision, A. H. Wetmore had  
been unable so far to provide for the  
opening of the Allison grounds during  
the evening but he hoped to have the  
proper arrangements completed in a  
few days. Mrs. W. C. Matthews had ar-  
ranged for the Centennial grounds.  
Rev. Mr. Barracough and Rev. Mr.  
Cotton would make the necessary ar-  
rangements for the opening of the  
Alexandra, Bentley street and the  
Aberdeen grounds.

There had been some objection on  
the part of residents of Dundas Ave-  
nue on account of the noise made by  
children in the grounds there during  
the evening. Mr. Belding said that the  
matter would be taken up immediately  
with the Playgrounds Association.

Neighborhood civic centers was an-  
other matter under discussion and it  
was hoped that some arrangements  
could be made for opening several cen-  
ters during the coming winter.

Surprise was expressed by those  
present at the meeting last night when  
it was said that the Alumnae of the  
High School had passed a resolution  
opposing the granting of the use of the  
High School assembly hall to the Com-  
munity Council for its meetings.

Already the council has asked the  
trustees for permission to hold the  
meeting in the hall. It was hoped that  
the members of the Alumnae of the  
High School would unite with the  
Community Council in its effort to fur-  
ther the interests of the people of St.  
John.

## SUGAR REFINERY MAIN FOUND SATISFACTORY PRESENTATION TO MR. AND MRS. STRICKLAND

Water was turned into the big  
twelve inch water main that is to sup-  
ply the new sugar refinery for the  
first time last week, and the pressure  
and the supply were found to be entirely  
satisfactory. In order to supply the re-  
finery with water a twelve inch main  
was laid from the Ballast wharf to  
the One Mile House and from there  
to the Little River dam, the old main  
will be utilized. Some of this section  
needs repairing and the work is being  
done now. It is expected that within a  
month the refinery will be drawing its  
supply of water from the Little River.  
Its supply will be entirely separate  
from the regular city supply.

At the present time the pipes of the  
refinery are being supplied from the  
mains beyond the One Mile House.

### Were Badly Worn.

Workers from the Water and Sewer-  
age Department are still engaged re-  
newing the service pipes in Main  
street between Paradise Row and  
Acadia street. Many of the pipes have  
been found to be in very bad condition.  
Where the lead ducts were laid on top  
of irregular rock the vibration of the  
traffic in the street has caused a cer-  
tain amount of movement in the pipe  
and in many cases the lead was found  
to have been worn completely through.  
Corrosion and dirt have helped to fill  
the pipes and cut off the water supply.  
The new service pipes are five-eighths  
of an inch in diameter and of iron.  
The Water and Sewerage Department  
says they should last for at least fifty  
years.

### New Catch Basins.

While the contractors for the re-  
pair of the roadway in Canterbury  
Church and Princess streets are pre-  
paring for the foundations of their  
work men from the sewerage depart-  
ment are busy renewing the catch  
basins. The old style catch basin in  
use in these streets was constructed  
of wood but these are to be replaced  
with brick structures with iron cov-  
erings and gratings.
