
Possibility of Political Dispute in Background Over Appointment of Successor to Earl Kitchener.

News received from Canadian headquarters at the front today shows that he was seen lying wounded in the thickest part of the battle on Friday last. Since then German wireless informa-tion picked up on the field confirms the fact that he was found and 'taken away by the enemy. General Williams is still reported missing, but it is believed at head-quarters that he was blown up and buried in a great explosion.

Out From Berlin, First Lord of Admiralty Balfour Says



The in-vested Germans broke out of Namema, suffering heavy losses. The German commandant was made prisoner, wounded. The demoralized natives are welcoming the British, whose losses are small."




