OPPOSITION
CONVENTION
HUGE FROST

Despite Telegraph's Enthusiasm the Gathering of Oppositionists at Hartland Last Tuesday was Disappointing.

Woodstock, N. B., Aug. 26.—The opposition caucus held at Hartland on Tuesday, which the Telegraph states was one of the most enthusiastic gatherings ever held in the county, is reported by the people there to have made less stir than any other public gathering in the last twenty years. By actual count there were not more than nineteen electors present, and Hartland, where the enthusiastic meeting was held, contributed only one delegate, not counting the proprietor of the inn where the visiting brethren sojourned during their stay.

Mr. John T. G. Carr of Hartland, who from his long business career in the county has great personal popularity would have made an acceptable candidate, also, it is understood, refused to run; and finally, as a last desperate resort, Chas. L. Smith, ex-M. P., who will be remembered by the people of this county as the great live stock expert of the old government, and G. W. Upham, whose claim to distinction rests upon the fact that he once voted against the Valley Railway, were tentatively selected to lead the forlorn hope.
