### NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC

The attention of the Public is called to the following extract from the by-laws of the New Brunswick Board of Fire Underwriters:

"The use of Gasoline, Vapor Light, or any other product of Naptha, shall not permitted except in Buildings isolated 100 feet and upwards, and then only, when vaporised in secure underground tanks outside the building and not less than 10 feet from it." Gasoline used for illuminating purposes, otherwise than above provided, will invalidate fire insurance policies.

According to the official returns of the fire patrol of Chicago from 1890 to 1904, 4,670 fires were caused by the use of gasoline in that city, resulting in 158 deaths.


