## CANADIAN WOMEN AND THEIR WORK

### WOMEN'S CANADIAN CLUBS

The first Women's Canadian Club was formed in 1907. One would not like to venture the statement that if men's Canadian Clubs had not existed it is improbable that a women's Canadian Club would ever have been added to the history of Canada. The fact is, however, that men's Canadian Clubs were formed first. The first city in Canada to possess a Women's Canadian Club was Montreal. The Women's Canadian Club of Winnipeg was inaugurated in the same year. Toronto followed suit with its Women's Canadian

Club. One other predominant motive which spurs on the growth of the Canadian Club is nationality. It is impossible to keep account of every Women's Canadian Club which has been formed since 1907. They are independent organizations which find it easy to stand alone. The Association of Canadian Clubs is a federation which includes both men's clubs and women's clubs. There are at least twelve Women's Canadian Clubs in Canada. The list includes clubs in London, Montreal, North Bay, Toronto, Ottawa, Quebec, St. John, Toronto, Vancouver, Victoria and Winnipeg.

Women's Canadian Clubs differ widely in some respects. But they all have a large membership. Montreal, which is the oldest Women's Canadian Club, is the only one, as far as the present writer knows, which keeps to the idea of the men's club and has a speaker address them at a luncheon. The officers of the Montreal Women's Canadian Club for this year are: President, Mrs. R. Wilson Bedford; vice-presidents, Madam Arthur Boyer and Miss Hurlbatt; treasurer, Mrs. G. H. Dugan; secretary, Mrs. Graham Drinkwater. The membership is in the neighborhood of 500. Considering the fact that the membership fee of the Montreal Women's Canadian Club is \$4 this membership is extraordinarily large. The constitution says that "the purpose of this club is to foster patriotism and to encourage a deeper and more serious interest amongst women in the institutions, history and resources of Canada, as well as to bring before them leading questions of the day both at home and abroad, and to endeavor to make Canadian women in each work as may be within their powers for the welfare and progress of the dominion."

A further object is to give women opportunities of hearing orators and men of eminence speak on these various subjects. It has, therefore, been resolved to invite speakers who will bring inspiration and instruction to address the members of the

Club in 1908. Since then, many Canadian Clubs for women have been organized in Canada. The growth of the idea has been wonderful. On the whole, the Canadian Club for women has kept pace very feebly with the Canadian Club for men, taking into consideration the fact that the movement began as a men's club. The great majority of Canadians, both men and women, delight to listen to distinguished visitors. They want to know what is going on in the world, outside of Canada, as well as in Canada. They want to see how the distinguished visitor looks. They wish to hear them speak for themselves. "I heard him speak," "I know what kind of a chap he is." There is nothing like having seen and heard a distinguished visitor for one's self when it comes to the understanding later of the great affairs of the world.
