Mr. Allen Jack's article in the February *Maritime Monthly* has awakened a lively interest in the education of the blind, a more numerous class than is generally supposed. Mr. Jack expatiates eloquently on the blessedness of vision, and commiserates those whose eyes have never looked upon the world, to whom art and nature, as made known to the brain by vision, are dark and meaningless. He also says that "to them the greater portion of the world is dead, and while their eager fingers learn the forms and features of loving mothers and faithful friends, tender glances and who have been so long lost." These are the words of a man who has been acquainted with blind people more than twenty years.

One of the library servants at a London club being short of funds sat down one night and wrote a collection of the names of prominent tradesmen of the city, requesting small loans, signing the name of the treasurer. He got over £50, and subsequently ten years in jail.

Late advices from India report that the famine among the natives in Bengal is becoming alarming, and fears are entertained of a general uprising of the people that will sweep the British Government of Transvaal, and the military were called out to quell the turbulent disposition of the natives.

It is hard to make people understand the value of pamphlets and the wisdom of preserving them. The late Bishop Wilberforce left a collection which he had made and carefully arranged from year to year in 177 thick volumes. The whole has been purchased by the National Library.

Further petitions for the removal of the venerable elms on the Mall at Boston have been presented to the City Council. It is observed that the enemies of the elms are taking advantage of the winter, when their branches hang bare, to get their petitions before the public.

Miss Clara Morris, the emotional actress, has as her companion a dog—little Scotch terrier—which so closely resembles a misbegotten mass of tailors' and cobblers' heads, that she has considered the animal the patronym of "Rags."

The International Rifle Match proposed between Ireland and America has been at last arranged. We learn by a dispatch that the Irish Rifle Association has accepted the conditions on which the American riflemen are willing to compete.

Peter Cooper in a speech the other night said that one of the things which he most surprised him in his reminiscences, was to observe how much he had learned from the things which he had himself been able to do. The receipt by which he had preserved his health and vigor, he attributed to his cheerful and friendly way of living. "Let me say then," he wrote to her saying that he was dead, and begging her as his parting request to stop and drop a word or a flower or a leaf upon his lonely grave if she happened to be passing in that direction.

Mr. Gladstone was re-elected by the Queen at Windsor this afternoon, when he tendered his resignation and that of his colleagues.

Mr. Disraeli has been summoned and will go to Windsor to-morrow. He conferred to-day with several members of the last Conservative Ministry. The new Government has already been partially constructed, and will probably be completed within a week.

THE RESULTS IN IRELAND.  
All the members for Ireland have been elected, and are classified as follows: Liberals 15; Conservatives 30; Home Rulers, nearly all of whom may be considered Liberals, 55.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.  
FREDERICTON, Feb. 18.
