MEDICAL ACADEMY MEETS

Detroit Physician Says Christian Science Fails To Cure Gastric Ulcer.

Three former Western Ontario men, now leading members of the medical profession in cities in the United States, where they reside, were the speakers at a regular meeting of the Western Ontario Academy of Medicine held in the Auditorium Friday afternoon. The meeting was largely attended by London and district practitioners, nurses and medical students, practically every member of the academy being present.

Dr. Angus McLean, an old Glencoe boy, now professor of surgery in the Detroit College of Medicine, was the first to deliver an address at the meeting. Taking for his subject, "Ulcer and Cancer of the Stomach and Duodenum," Dr. McLean described expert treatment, and more modern diagnosis of these two types of malignancy, illustrating his discourse by sketches. He mentioned a serious case, which came under his observation, wherein a malignant ulcer received Christian Science treatment for two years, only to perforate the stomach suddenly last Thanksgiving Day, which time, he declared, introduced a novel coincidence. Medical assistance was summoned, and with great difficulty the patient's life was saved. A similar case with similar treatment suddenly ruptured the stomach of a patient on New Year's Eve last, but faith in Christian Science caused him to delay summoning medical aid for twelve hours, with the result that the attack proved fatal. "Therefore," declared the speaker, "Christian Science treatment, which may be good for some ills, failed with gastric ulcer."

A Bad Omen. "One good type of carcinoma, if there is such a type of malignancy," continued the speaker, "is that of the pylorus, closing it quickly, and then you can diagnose it at once. When a woman suffering with cancer of the breast informs you that it seems to have decreased in size, this is a bad omen, as by metastasis the carcinoma has likely affected the pleural cavity. Metastasis, after removal, is the most treacherous thing of malignancy. Cancer should be attended to at the earliest convenience. It is difficult to diagnose it from gastric ulcer in the aged, and you should give the patient the benefit of the doubt, and get it out."

WEEK-END IN SURGERY. Replete with a wealth of witty remarks, Dr. Thomas S. Cullen, professor of gynecology in Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, who spent a few years in London in his younger days, entertained those present by a splendid discussion on "Weak Points in Canadian and American Surgery." His first paid a tribute to the pioneers in surgery who blazed the way for present-day methods. He declared that 25 years ago in this city the mortality following surgical operations was 25 per cent, and the fact that now this has been reduced to 2 per cent speaks well for advances

Chas. Oakley has resigned his post as rural mail carrier for route 3 in this district.

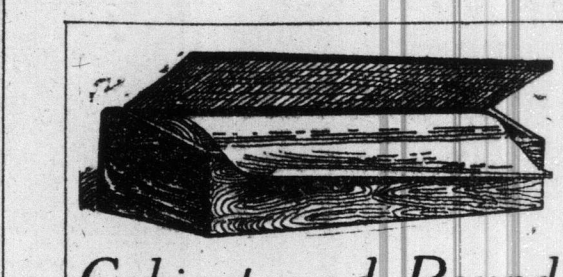

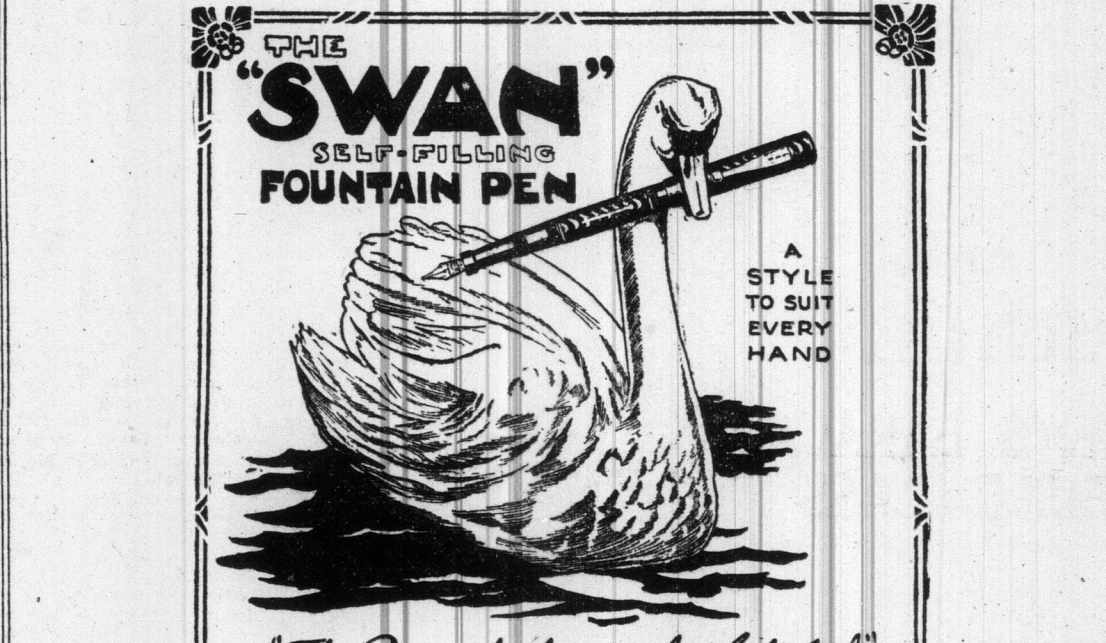
