Death of a Stratford Manufacturer.

Elected Moderator.
Lieut.-Col. the Rev. John Pringle, D.D., of St. Andrew's Church, Sydney, Nova Scotia was elected Moderator of the Presbyterian General Assembly which was opened in St. Paul's Presbyterian Church Hamilton last evening. Oxfords Estimates less.

The estimates for the Oxford House of Refuge showed an increase of \$1,200 over what it was last year and even this, the Chairman of the Finance Committee said, was just a little less than the expenditure of last year at this institution, which was \$10,434.15.

Two Fires at Hamilton.
Two serious fires occurred in Hamilton yesterday afternoon. At 12:51 the firemen were called to the plant of the Canada Iron Foundries Company. The fire broke out in the yard of the G.T.R., where they found a frame building 120 by 40 feet on fire. The building which was owned by the G.T.R. was destroyed with a loss of about \$8,000. The Foundries Company used it as a storage warehouse for patterns, sand and facing material. Their loss was about \$8,000. The fire-fighters had just returned when they were called to John Kent's barber shop and poolroom 265 Barton street east. The loss there was about \$3,000. A peculiar feature of the fire in the barber shop was that there was an explosion soon after it started that blew the plate glass windows out into the street. The cause of the explosion is now known.

The funeral was held on Wednesday morning from 45 Erasmus Road to St. Boniface church at New Germany for requiem high mass. Interment took place at New Germany.


