Ptes. Ellis and Kranz are Back

The Former Witnessed the Riots in Camp Ryle
Pte. Harry Ellis and Sgt. Chas. Kranz returned home from overseas on Thursday afternoon when they were given a hearty welcome by their many friends and relatives. Pte. Ellis enlisted with 118th Battalion over two years ago and has come through the war without a scratch. Sgt. Kranz enlisted in Toronto. Both young men are looking fine and delighted to see their old friends again.

Pte. Ellis stated that he was in camp Ryle when the rioting of Canadian soldiers took place. The riots were started by the Russian and foreign element in the army. The

men broke into the canteens and of five quarters and before the riot was stopped it had assumed good sized proportions. When the rioters reached the canteen of the camp where Pte. Ellis was stationed they were stopped by fixed bayonets in the hands of the soldier and the riot came to end after a number had been killed and wounded. The soldiers at this camp did not get food and were held here while the Americans and other soldiers from Canada who had been overseas for a shorter period were sent home and these were some of the reasons why the riot took place.

WITH THE DEPUTATION
Waterloo was represented at Toronto on Friday when a deputation of about 500 waited on Premier Heast and Hon. Findlay Macdormid and urged that the Provincial government proceed at an early date with the construction of a highway between Toronto and Sarnia. The Minister of Public Works, speaking for himself stated that his sympathies all lay with the request. The Premier stated that the government would give the matter serious consideration.

Cold Storage Houses To Be Established

"FARM TO WORLD'S MARKETS IS PROPOSAL OUTLINED BY HON. MR. CREECH."

Ottawa March 27.—Hon. T.A. Creech intimated to the agricultural committee to-day that \$50,000 would be placed in the supplementary estimates as a start on the same system as they have in the United States of regular inspection of herds for tuberculosis and the awarding of certificates for herds free from this disease. The Minister of Agriculture also stated that it had been arranged to appropriate one million dollars for the erection of an up-to-date cold storage plant on the water front at Montreal. He said there were 140 cold storage plants in the Dominion, but many were not up-to-date and they would be placed under Government inspection. The system would be completed from the farm to the markets of the world. This meant a good refrigerator service from the farm to the har-

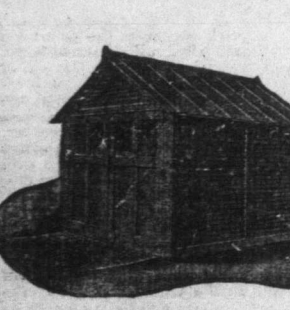

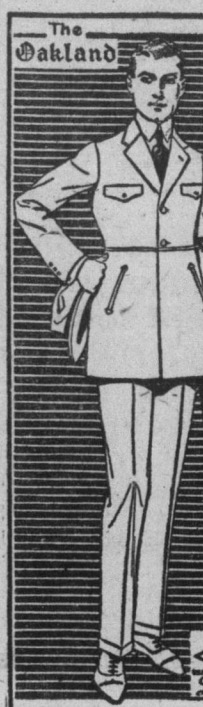

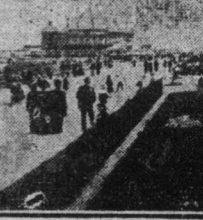
