Letter from Grand Chancellor O'Connor.

DEAR SIR AND BROTHER—Although I am strongly opposed to discussing the matter in the press, still I consider the matter in dispute has caused such an unsettled feeling, that the time has arrived when some decisive step should be taken.

The framers of our constitution exhibited their prudence and foresight when they incorporated in the constitution, in article 23, the provision that no separate beneficiary jurisdiction, when they acquired a certain membership, knowing from the history of the A. O. U. W. that a difficulty such as we are now experiencing would arise if this privilege were granted.

It would have been a graceful act on the part of the Supreme Council, had they, at the time of the formation of our constitution, decided to limit the number of members who would be allowed to acquire a separate beneficiary jurisdiction.

Another important question in the law has been decided by the Supreme Council, in reference to the custody of the medical certificates of our members.
