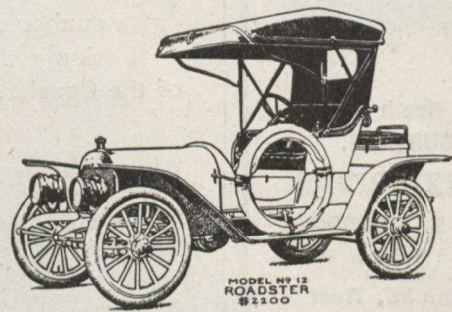
SPREAD OF APPENDICITIS
