## 'DING' LUFFMAN GIVES RELIANCE EDGE OVER FLIERS

Former Point Anne Hurler  
Stops I.T.S. With 6 Hits  
for 9-2 Win

### TWO HOME RUNS

Behind "Ding" Luffman's masterful six-hit pitching Reliance made it three games to two over the No. 5 I.T.S. "Flyers" in the best-in-seven series for the Belleville Softball League championship by downing FO. Warren's Airmen 9 to 2 at the Exhibition Park last evening.

Although the Flyers opened the scoring with a single counter in the initial frame, Luffman was really never in difficulty and blanked the Airmen for seven consecutive frames before they scored an unearned eighth-inning run. In the meantime Gene LaBonne's three-run homer in the fifth and Jimmie Barriage's two-run circuit blow in the eighth were enough for Reliance and Luffman to coast in ease.

"Moon" Mullins' second inning double was the only extra base hit collected off Luffman, as the Airmen failed to count more than one hit at a time as the former Point Anne moundsman pitched steady ball and was always on top. The Flyers scored their first runs as the result of a walk, McKay's sacrifice and Gignac's single. The other counter was unearned, two walks, an error and a fielder's choice, letting Daniels score. Incidentally Daniels scored both the Airmen's runs. Mullins and Gignac got two hits each for the vanquished Flyers.

### Helped Own Cause

Luffman helped his own cause with a two-run producing single and scored the Reliance first run in the third to knot the count. Singles by LaBonne, Loft, Luffman and Henn gave Reliance three runs in the fourth and they coasted in even though LaBonne hit for the circuit with two aboard in the fifth. Not to be out-done, Jim Barriage slashed a hard drive to deep right centre with Henn aboard in the eighth for a homer, bringing the winners' count to nine.

Jim Barriage was the big hitter of the night with his circuit smash and two singles. LaBonne and Ethier each got two hits, one of Gene's being a four-master. Reliance fielded strongly behind Luffman's six-hit pitching. Cy Barriage at short, Jim Barriage in left and Phil Loft in right all coming through with some sensational fielding efforts when circus catches halted the Flyers in any attempt to rally. Bancroft shone defensively for the losers.

Steve Borovitch, the Flyers' Yankee pitcher from Detroit, proved no mystery to Spike Fryke's nine last night and was derricked in favor of Bancroft soon after LaBonne's homer in the fifth. Bill Bancroft took over the pitching chores and halted Reliance for two frames before Barriage duplicated LaBonne's willow-wielding effort. Bancroft struck out the side in the seventh, however.

## STATION RECORDS SHATTERED AT ATHLETIC MEET

I.T.S. Stages Show and  
Records for 100 Yards  
and Pole Vault Broken

### MAYOR TAKES SALUTE

Station records were shattered with abandon at the annual field day staged at No. 5 I.T.S. of the R.C.A.F. here yesterday. The most noticeable establishment of new station records were in the track events and the pole vault.

A tie was declared for the station individual field day championship between Leroy Pietz of Crystal Beach and Gerald Sharkey of Winnipeg. Pietz took the century dash and the ball throw, while Sharkey came down on top in the middle distance runs of the mile and half mile gallops to capture top honors. Flight 29, with FO. McMahon in charge won the collective day's honors, while Flight 32, under FO. Benner, was second.

Pietz established a new station time for the 100 yard dash, when he came home in 10 2-5 seconds. Wright lowered the time for the station 440 yard dash at 57 seconds while Sharkey added to other records by doing the 880 yards in two minutes 17 seconds and the mile in 5.09 minutes for records. A McPhee got a big hand for adding six inches to the station pole vault distance as he cleared the bar at ten feet ten inches and received the biggest ovation of the day for his efforts.

Wing Commander A. J. Snetsinger welcomed the civilian public and encouraged the competitors after His Worship, Mayor Rollins took the salute for the afternoon's parade. A goodly number of civilians from Belleville enjoyed the day's competition. Wing Commander Snetsinger was chief referee, FL. Cameron and Sgt. Attwell announcers, PO. Avren and FO. Warren clerks, FL. Douglas was observer while FO. McMahon and Sgt. Hamilton were starters. FL. Dickson was judge, while other officers and non-commissioned men materially assisted in the meet. Lieut. Col. B. C. Donnan, officer commanding the Argyll Light Infantry, was also in attendance for the meet.
