WILLIAM GORDON

JAP LOSSES AT BIG FIGHT.

Only 113 Killed and 424 Wounded—Togo Wounded.

Tokio, June 2.—The Japanese losses in the battle of the Sea of Japan were 113 officers and men killed and 424 of-

ficers and men wounded. The losses were distributed as follows: Mikasa,

68; Adzuma, 39; Shikishima, 37; Asa-

shi, 31; Fuji, 28; Idzuma, 26; Nishin,

27; Otowa, 26; Kasuga, 26; Trushima,

18; Asama, 15; Naniwa, 17; Tokiwa,

15; Takuma, 11; Chitose, 6; Idzumi, 16;

Kasuga, 3; Hashidate, 5; Nivaka, 4.

The casualties on the destroyers and the torpedo boats were 87.

Commander Togo was wounded on the Adzuma.

The Mikasa's Thanks.

Tokio, June 2.—The Emperor has issued the following rescript to Admiral Togo:

"Our combined fleet encountered the enemy's fleet in the Korean Strait and after several days' desperate battle annihilated it, accomplishing an unprecedented feat."

"We are glad that by the loyalty of our officers and men we have been enabled to respond to the spirits of our ancestors."

"Through the war be long, we hope that there will be joy and peace and security throughout the world."

Togo to the Mikasa.

Tokio, June 2.—Admiral Togo, responding to the Imperial rescript commending his appreciation and saying:

"That we gained a success beyond our expectation is due to the brilliant virtue of Your Majesty, to the protection of spirits of your Imperial ancestors and not to the action of human beings."

"We shall be faithful to your Imperial will."

AN EXCRUCIATING ACCIDENT.

Square Yard of Skin Torn From a Young Man's Side.

Winnipeg, June 2.—With a square yard of skin torn from his right side, extending from the armpits down, laying bare the muscles at the back of the shoulder and part of the chest, John Wilson, 25 years old, who boarded at Louise Bridge, was brought to St. Boniface Hospital yesterday, suffering from a terrible agony.

He had been employed in the Alpit Brick Works, and had his clothing caught in the gearing of one of the machines used in the making of brick, being dragged along the traveling chain till his right side was close to the machinery. The man retained consciousness, but suffered severely. He may not recover.

200 KILLED OR INJURED.

Victims of Earthquake—500 Houses Collapsed in Sicily.

Cetina, Montenegro, June 2.—There was an earthquake yesterday throughout Montenegro.

Several houses collapsed, and one person was killed and several injured. The Belcastua mountain is showing signs of volcanic activity.

The earthquake caused great damage at Scutari, Albania, where about 500 houses collapsed and 200 persons were killed or injured.

North Oxford Now Clear-Cut.

Woodstock, June 2.—With George Smith, Liberal candidate, issuing a manifesto which supports the Government in its entire policy, and D. R. Ross of Embro, who has been spoken of as a probable independent candidate, declaring that he is not going into the fight, the issue becomes a clean-cut one between Mr. Wallace, Conservative, and Mr. Smith.

Electricians on Strike.

Winnipeg, June 2.—The strike of electricians has assumed an acute stage, and close on a hundred workmen are out.

IS VALID

City Solicitor so Views the Early Closing By-Law—Letter to the Mayor.

Mayor Cowan has received the following letter which speaks for itself:

George W. Cowan, Esq., Mayor of Chatham, City.

Dear Sir:

RE GROCER SHOPS.

I have carefully examined By-Law No. 933, passed on April 3rd, 1905, to take effect on April 15th, 1905.

I am of opinion that that By-Law is valid and that it cannot be quashed.

In my opinion the By-Law is not void for uncertainty in allowing shops to be opened on the day preceding a holiday. "Holiday" is a well defined term and its meaning is set forth in the Interpretation Act of our Statutes. The uncertainty of the time by reason of the holiday not being now fixed does not invalidate the By-Law. This was expressly held in Regina vs. McMillan, 28 O.R. 172.

In my opinion, the Council had power to pass the By-Law in question without any petition on the part of the grocers. The Council passed a resolution giving power to the proper committee to give due publicity to the By-Law and that committee did give such publicity to it, as the Council approves of. No person is now complaining of having been charged with a violation of the By-Law without knowing of the By-Law.

Every person knows of it and those who are objecting to it are objecting because they know and disapprove of it. In my opinion, the Statute so far as publicity is concerned has been sufficiently complied with.
