THIRD SUNDAY IN LENT CONCEALMENT OF SIN IN CONFESSION "He was casting out a devil, and the same wa umb" (Luke xi, 14)

dumb" (Luke xi, 14) In to-day's gospel we read of a man possessed by a devil, and made dumb by him. Our Saviour heated this stricken man by driving the evil spirit out of him, and he regained his speech, so that the multitude were surprised. To this dumb man may be compared those who are asnamed to contess their sins to the priest, and who, therefore, tail to receive absolution. As the evil spirit deprived that man of his laculty of speech, so does the devil exert his power to keep sinners from speaking to the priest about their sins. about their sins.
