A team goes ahead, hitched to a scraper that scrapes the ice clean which enables one team to draw such an immense load. They camp on the ice at night, carry planks for the horses to stand on and the men pitch their tent, cook their meals and sleep in the tents no matter how cold the weather may be. The fish are shipped to all parts of the United States.
