

Will Press Fight Against Union H

Statement Issued by Committee of Presbyterian Church Association. LEGAL FIRMS RETAINED.

Plan Under Way to Start the Publication of Weekly Paper.

Rev. Andrew Robertson, first vicepresident of the Presbyterian Church Association, has given out the follow-

A meeting of the General Committee of the Presbyterian Church Association, largely attended by members from various parts of the country, was held on Tuesday and Wednesday f this week in the city of Toronto.

The meeting was held to consider the present situation in its various hases and tocomplete the organization of the movement. Since the adournment of the Presbyterian Conocation some six weeks ago, the task of working out the details of the organization has been receiving the ttention of the officers.

Principal Fraser, of the Presbyteran Theological College of Montreal, the President of the Association, was present in person at the Tuesday sessions of the meeting. Letters nessages of encouragement support were received from represenative quarters throughout the counry from the Atlantic to the Pacific Coasts. An executive committee w formed to carry on the affairs of the Association. Mr. James Turnbull, of oronto, was appointed chairman the executive committee, and Mr Tames Rodger, of Montreal, was ap Sub-committees were also formed

as follows: On finance, with Mr. . McDonald, Toronto, as Chairman on publicity, with Rev. Dr. Eakin, Toonto, as chairman, and on legal uestions and measures, with Mr John Mackay, Toronto, as chairman It was decided to proceed imme liately with the incorporation of company with an authorized capital of \$100,000 for the purpose of publish ing a high-class national weekly t be dedicated to the interests of Dominion of Canada, and to stan for the preservation of the histori

resbyterian Church in Canada as ne of the greatest of national inter ests. Assurances of support for th proposed paper, and subscriptions the capital stock of the company to be incorporated for its publication, were received from all quarters of the Dominion. Pending the publica tion of the first number thereof, was decided to issue a 'Messenger" a egular intervals, for the purpose of expounding, in a systematic manner the cause of the Presbyterian Church

The sole object of the Association s to preserve the Presbyterian Church in Canada. It was clearly realized that the object could not be accomplished except by taking effec tive steps to that end. The measures therefore, proposed to be taken b secessionist majority of the church, to extinguish the historic resbyterian Church in Canada will e met in an appropriate manner No illusions are entertained as t he gravity of the situation and no ysteria prevails on the subject. The ommittee, backed by an increasingpowerful association, absolutely united on this question, will prose cute quietly but with fixed and un

alterable purpose the duties laid upon it, whatever may be involved. Messrs. Blake, Lash, Anglin and Cassels, of the City of Toronto, and Messrs. Lafleur, MacDougall Macfarlane, of Montreal were retained as the legal advisers of the Association to deal with the situation as the ocasion may require.


