SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

A family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskat-chewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land I agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of a least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price of the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homesteader who has exhausted his 50 acres extra.
