TO FIGHT DUEL

Caillaux and His Opponent Have Real Argument to Settle

[By Special Wire to The Courier]
PARIS, May 4.—It would now appear that in spite of the decision of the arbitrators to the contrary, Joseph Caillaux, former minister of finance and Fernand D'Aillieres are to fight a duel. M. D'Aillieres was M. Caillaux's opponent in the recent election to the chamber of deputies. Referring to the killing last March of Gaston Calmette, editor of The Figaro, by M. Caillaux's wife, he posted bills in the constituency saying clean electors would refuse to become "accomplices in crime." M. Caillaux consequently challenged him to a duel. The seconds of M. D'Aillieres to-day decided that the dispute was not ended with the decision of the arbitrators, that the incident was closed and they announced that the affair is to be settled by a duel with pistols, each man to fire two shots.

Hon. Wm. Gibson Passes Away

HAMILTON, Ont., May 4.—Hon. William Gibson, contractor and capitalist, died at his home in Beamsville shortly before noon to-day. Besides being president of the Bank of Hamilton and Hamilton Jockey Club Senator Gibson was interested in a large number of financial institutions both in Canada and the United States, was widely known as a railway contractor and Free Mason of an exalted rank. Born at Peterhead, Scotland, in 1849, he graduated from the academy there and when 21 years of age came to Hamilton, going later to Beamsville, where his uncle conducted a stone quarry. Six years later, when his uncle died, he took charge of the business.

NEW YORK, May 4.—Silent picketing by crepe-sleeved men and women, who hold John D. Rockefeller and John D. material should be complete by May 12th. Mr. Young, for the department of education declared that the case might assume such shape that he would not be ready to go on at the end of two weeks.

"It is said," declared Mr. Young, "to be an attack on the validity of the whole regulations in question." The material ought to be matured in two weeks, concluded Mr. Justice Kelly.

"We are anxious to expediate the matter," declared Mr. Agnew for the board.

"I should think they ought to be," commented the judge. "The injunction must stand in the meantime. You will warn your people."

OTTAWA, Ont., May 4.—Until a judgment is heard on the Ottawa Separate school injunction at Toronto, none of the teachers will receive any salary. The board is enjoined from paying the salaries of any unqualified teachers and Chairman Genest to-day took the ground that he did not know who came under that classification and in the meantime would refuse to sign any salary cheques.

It was learned to-day also that the French majority of trustees would in the event of the board being compelled to live up to regulation 17 make every school in the city a bilingual institution, replacing all the Irish teachers who do not speak French. At present negotiations are under way with an order of Irish priests to come to Ottawa and take charge of the boys' schools under a year's permit from the department, giving them time to write on the qualifying examinations.

The French majority proposes an important ruling to be promulgated by Cardinal Begin after his return from the Papal Consistory, by which Irish taxpayers who are transferring their support to the Public schools will be denied the sacraments of the church.
