French batteries at St. Mihiel, south of Verdun, are reported to have destroyed an entire battery of German artillery which had been particularly active in swooping the French positions. There is a dearth of news from German sources concerning the operations of Emperor William's forces, either in France or in Russia.

WAS GLORIOUS SIGHT WHEN TROOPS SAILED

How the Canadian Fleet of Transports Sailed Across the Ocean.

[By Special Wire to the Courier]
NEW YORK, Oct. 20. - A line of grey transports led by a pilot boat and two British cruisers and flanked by an armada of battleships, cruisers and destroyers, a smudge of its smoke against the sky as far as sailors could see to the east and west - such was the fleet that carried Canada's troops to England, and its convoys as glimpsed from the decks of the Minnewaska, 370 miles from the mouth of the Thames, on October 10. Officers of the steamer told the special spectacle upon her arrival here to-day.

There were thirty-two transports in the line and they churned the water of one another's wake at distances of half a mile to a mile. Each transport flew the British flag and each was painted the battle color of the sea, steel grey, even to the funnels. Well to the front of the long line, perhaps five miles in advance, steamed the leader - apparently sent ahead to make sure the way was clear, for cruiser to the starboard and another to port forward.

All the transports were converted passenger liners or merchantmen and some of them were recognized, or at least it is thought they were, by the Minnewaska's officers who viewed the wonderful maritime procession through glasses.

The fleet really moved in three lines. The transports sandwiched between a line of warships on each side. Among the warships were many destroyers sent out from British ports to reinforce the larger war craft as the fleet neared its destination.

The day was one of brilliant sunshine, the sky was cloudless and the distance of the Minnewaska from the line about five miles. Notwithstanding the fact that the British ensign floated over the liner, a cruiser darted out from the line of convoys, circled the Minnewaska, came quite close and steamed alongside till the last transport was a speck on the horizon. Then the cruiser turned about and steamed away, without having flashed a word to the liner, either by wireless or signal, to join the rear guard.

GERMAN OFFENSIVE BROK

Tremendous Given to Moment Near Coast.

Enemy is Str Great Force Battle Cont

[By Special Wire to the C LONDON, Oct. 20. - A comparison of the official reports Paris and Berlin leads to conclusion that all along the front battle front in Belgium the Germans have assumed the offensive, but their supreme efforts against the allies left.

The new supplementary official communications indicate that on the left, the allies are not acting on the defensive.

The great turning movement undoubtedly developing the corner of Belgium between France and the sea, but which remains in a haze as to whether the turning movement on the part of the allies around the right flank, or man operation to envelop the lies left.

The impression grows that these reports are true, and indicate that the allies are now held along the Belgium and the allies are making efforts to hurl back the invaders. Late reports from Dutch sources declare that German forces have been repulsed from Ostend, and are now being held near the Scheldt river.
