TURKS SEEK PEACE

Geneva, July 2.—Nedjemken Ed-fendi, the Turkish Minister of Justice, accompanied by Passadji Elendi, was expected here to-day from Vienna, for the purpose, it is reported, of opening separate peace negotiations with the Triple Entente. It is stated that the delegates are invested with official powers.

Recent despatches have stated that the Turkish Minister of Justice, with a fellow delegate, was on his way to Switzerland to meet representatives of the Entente powers. They were reported on July 14 as having passed through Sofia, Bulgaria.

LONGING FOR PEACE

GROWING IN GERMANY War Weariness Strongly Evident in Wide Circle of Population. Stockholm, July 22.—A private message to the Stockholm Tidning from Berlin, which, curiously enough, passed the censor, states that war weariness in Germany is becoming strongly evident in wide circles of population, and especially among the poorer classes. Great excitement prevails, and a proclamation of a state of siege is expected. The Dagens Nyheter comments on this by saying that even if it is exaggerated, one thing is certain, that among the whole German population longing for peace is strongly felt.

TRIBUNE'S TREACHANT STATEMENT

No Further Bandy-ing of Verbiage With Germany Can be Expected.

By Special Wire to the Courier.

New York, July 22.—Under the caption of "The end of words," the Tribune this morning says editorially: "More than two months have now passed since the American citizens on the Lusitania were murdered by German officers and men. The crime itself was one of the most unparalleled acts of brutality of which history has any record. Now for the third time the government of the United States is to despatch a note to Germany asking the imperial government to make reparation for a four murder and give assurance that henceforth American citizens may sail the seas in safety when complying with international law. In the whole history of the international relations there is no record of patience, forbearance, endurance to equal that shown by the United States in recent weeks. More than this, if there were the smallest prospect of benefit to humanity by a prolongation of the exchange of words it is certain that the American patience would be adequate for further trial.

If the German government shall again refuse to meet the issue, again evade the question, and seek to put upon a free people the shackles of its own purposes to bend us to its alleged necessities, then diplomacy is bankrupt, then the greatest good will any people has ever shown another will have proved without avail. The message we are sending is in any formal sense an ultimatum. It is not a promise or a threat, whatever wise and necessary warning it may convey."

ON ITS WAY. Washington, July 22.—The new American note to Germany is on its way to Berlin. It clears from Washington over the telegraph wires during the night and to-day was being flashed over the cables to London and thence to Copenhagen, where it goes overland wires again, to the German foreign office. It should reach its destination to-night or, early to-morrow.

HAMILTON WILL GIVE 200 MACHINE GUNS

Hamilton, July 22.—A committee has been formed with Lieut.-Col. Labatt as President, to raise money for machine guns. It is planned to raise enough money to buy at least 200 here. Some twenty citizens have promised to contribute. It is expected that many others will follow that example.

ATTEMPT ON WORKS.

Montreal, July 22.—An attempt to blow up the boiler house at the Angus shops where war munitions are being filled was discovered and frustrated by the arrest of Demetrio Morelo, an Austrian; according to Inspector Mansell, the principal witness in Montreal. Archibald Bruce, secretary of state for Belgium, who was sent on a special mission to President Wilson, by King Albert, and the consuls and consular-general stationed in Montreal. Archbishop Bruchesi received the Belgians after the mass. A civic reception was tendered Mr. De Sadelier in noon.

BELGIAN HOLIDAY

By Special Wire to the Courier. Montreal, July 22.—The national holiday of the Belgium nation was observed by the Belgian colony here to-day. At 9.30 a solemn high mass was celebrated for the repose of the souls of Belgium's dead. The service was attended by Louis De Sadelier, secretary of state for Belgium, who was sent on a special mission to President Wilson, by King Albert, and the consuls and consular-general stationed in Montreal. Archbishop Bruchesi received the Belgians after the mass. A civic reception was tendered Mr. De Sadelier in noon.

JAPAN UNABLE TO ACCEDE TO BRITISH REQUEST

Tokio, July 2 (correspondence of the Associated Press)—Japan has informed Great Britain that she is unable to accede to Great Britain's request to announce a prohibition of trading in the Far East with citizens of hostile nations. The British government recently gazetted a regulation prohibiting trading with nationals of Germany and Austria in China, Siam and Persia. Great Britain had been waiting for assurances that Japan would adopt similar measures. However, the Japanese Government, after consulting leading business men, decided it could not permit the enforcement of such a measure. The government is understood to have pointed out that in effect there is no trading between Japanese and representatives of hostile countries in the Far East. Japanese merchants are believed to have opposed the British project on the ground that it would harm the business interests of the empire.
