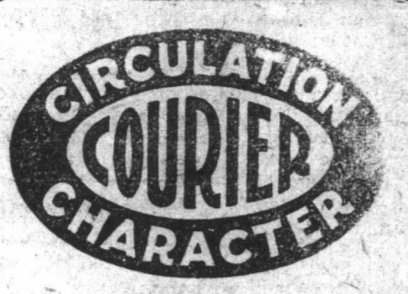

DEMAND OR NO DEMAND?
By Courier Leased Wire
Osaka, Japan, March 12.—According to a despatch to The Mainichi of this city from Washington, the States is demanding a guarantee for the withdrawal of Japanese troops from Siberia immediately the Russian crisis is over.

A Denial
Washington, March 12.—It was authoritatively stated here to-day by officials in close touch with the situation that no such demand as referred to in the foregoing despatch has been made on Japan by the United States and that such a demand would be considered as impugning Japan's good faith, which the United States already had recognized. It also was stated that if Japanese troops go to Siberia the question of their withdrawal is expected to go before the peace conference.

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SAYS FLORIDA IS FINE PLACE

Mr. Ross McLeod of Echo Place, To Take up Residence There.

A week ago, Mr. Ross McLeod was picking ripe oranges, grapefruit and roses in Florida; to-day he is cleaning snow from the front of his Echo Place residence, or at least so much that it is done. That's going from one extreme to another, we'll say.

Mr. McLeod's trip south was of a business nature, as he purchased a few acres of grapefruit grove and an acre for the erection of a bungalow on Lakeland Island, Florida, and purposes very shortly to take up his residence there. He is enthusiastic concerning the climate. Pleasantly warm in the daytime, it always turns cool in the evening, and showers are almost a daily occurrence. The elevation of Lakeland is 307 feet above the sea level.

Five years ago, Lakeland was a group of eight or ten frame buildings; to-day it is a thriving—everywhere shines in the climate of Florida—city of ten thousand inhabitants with beautiful churches, schools and public buildings; "as clean a city as I have ever seen," declares Mr. McLeod. Polk county, of which Lakeland is the centre, has, or will this summer have, three hundred miles of asphalt roads.

MESSAGE OF HOPE TO THE RUSSIANS

President Wilson Invites Soviet to Reject German Peace Terms

Washington, March 11.—On the eve of the gathering at Moscow of the Russian Congress of Soviets, the United States now recognizes no Government in Russia, but the President cabled his message to the Bolshheviks at Brest-Litovsk, President Wilson has sent a message of sympathy to the Russian people through Congress, with a pledge that the United States will avail itself of every opportunity to aid them in driving out autocracy and restoring Russia to her place in the world with complete sovereignty and independence.

WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any man over 18 years old, who was the owner of a parcel of land in the Dominion of Canada, or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Six months in each of three years after securing homestead patent and cultivating the same. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 30 acres and erect a house worth \$2000.

Recipients of entries may count time of employment as farm labourers in Canada during 1917, as residence outside under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised for pre-emption, notices of sale are sent to the nearest post-office and have been honorably discharged receive one day priority in applying for entry. Agency Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented.

AUSTRIAN CREDIT

Amsterdam, March 12.—The Upper House of the Austrian Reichsrath, a Vienna despatch says, has adopted a provisional war credit of six billion kroner for the next four months. During the debate on the bill, Dr. von Seydler, the premier, emphasized the necessity for reforms in the Austrian constitution.

CHINA TO CO-OPERATE

Peking, March 12.—(By the Associated Press)—China in response to an inquiry from Tokio, has signified her intention to co-operate with Japan in the protection of allied interests in the Far East. The Chinese war bureau has been requested to arrange for the sending of two divisions to northern Manchuria. Japan will bear the expense pending the completion of a proposed American loan to China.

MONTREAL FIRE WAS NOT DUE TO DEFECTIVE WIRE

First Report Without Foundation—All Electric Equipment Saved Without Damage.

The early report that the fire in the Grey Nuns Hospital in Montreal was due to defective wiring attached to the electrical apparatus in the X-ray room of the wing used by the Military Hospitals Commission as a convalescent ward for soldiers, has been declared without foundation by the authorities.

Investigation established the fact that the blaze started in the floor above the one occupied by the soldiers and did not reach the X-ray room until the officers had been able to remove all the apparatus. The expensive equipment, situated only a slight water damage which was quickly remedied.

All Records Saved.

All the records of the M.H.C. and the M.C. were saved by the officers and staff when the 250 patients had been seen safely out of the building and all the assistance possible given in rescuing the babies.

The portion of the building which the soldiers occupied is not in any way fit for occupation now. The time it will take to prepare quarters into condition again depends entirely upon the action taken by the order.

Other Accommodation.

Increased accommodation has been arranged for by the M.H.C. in the Royal Victoria and Montreal General Hospitals; also in the Drummond Convalescent Home, and the Khaki League Convalescent Home No. 3 on Dorchester street west.

There were approximately 250 military patients in the Grey Nuns Convalescent Home, including ten bed patients. Through the prompt action of the authorities and the generous help of Montreal citizens in opening their doors and providing transportation none suffered serious ill effects.
