SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties: Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$1.00 an acre.

Duties: Six months' residence in each of three years after farming homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$1.00 per acre. Duties: Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stoney land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

Russia Pledges Herself to Extend Territory if They Help.

LONDON, Dec. 28.—Russia has offered new and more extensive territorial concessions to Roumania for permission to march Russian armies across Roumanian soil to attack Bulgaria. This news is contained in a despatch from Bucharest. The exact nature of the Russian offers is unknown.

The new Russian offers to Roumania, the despatch says, are made in a personal letter from the Czar to the Roumanian King delivered by the Russian Minister, M. Schebeko. It is understood that the Czar offers very extensive territorial concessions to Roumania if that country will declare war against Bulgaria and join the Russian forces in a combined attack, and that less extensive offers are made in the event permission is granted for the transportation of Russian troops across Roumania.

In the absence of news of any action by either the Teutonic or allied forces on the Salonica front suspense in London respecting the situation in the Balkans is reaching a very acute stage. It is everywhere felt that the troops defending Salonica are on the eve of what will perhaps prove one of the most important battles of the war. If the Germans are held it means a partial collapse at least of their designs against the Suez Canal and Egypt. If they are thrown back it means not only the entire collapse of these designs, but will in all likelihood prove the turning point in the war. On the other hand, if the Anglo-French forces are defeated and driven from Salonica the cause of the Entente powers will have received possibly its most serious reverse.

This at least is the situation as it is portrayed by most of the military commentators yesterday. There is no one but who appreciates the enormous stakes at play, and there is little attempt to minimize the seriousness of the situation.

It can be readily stated that the Allies now have a force of roundly 400,000 holding the roads to Salonica. Against this army there is drawn a German force of uncertain numbers. It is recalled that the Austro-German and Bulgarian armies sent into Serbia when the Balkan campaign began were estimated at about 370,000 men. The casualties during the Serbian campaign were, however, very considerable, and must have depleted that force greatly. Meanwhile there has been no hint of how many reinforcements have been sent to all the broken ranks. This being the case, the commentators are backward about making estimates. They agree, however, that the combined Austro-German and Turkish-Bulgarian armies about to participate in the attack on Salonica certainly are not numerically inferior to those of the Allies, but are if anything somewhat greater.

A despatch from Rome yesterday indicates that the Germans have completed their diplomatic manoeuvrings with the Greeks, finally insuring Greek territorial integrity, and in return receiving Greek assurance that no aid will be afforded the Allies.

More important, however, than the Greek assurances in this respect is the report that the Greek Government has consented to Bulgarian and Turkish co-operation in the Austro-German offensive against the French and British forces.

If this news is correct, and it is reliably reported, it means that the hope of the Allies to embroil the Greeks with the Bulgarians is lost.

SHAH DISSOLVES CABINET.
 Pro-German Group is Gone, and Pro-Ally Advisers Are Chosen.

LONDON, Dec. 28.—A Teheran despatch says that the Persian Cabinet, which had been pro-German, has been dissolved by the Shah, and will be replaced by one favorable to the British and Russian interests.

This news is of peculiar significance and of great importance to the Entente cause. It means that a serious blow has been dealt the German and Turkish propaganda in Persia, which during recent months was growing to an alarming extent. It also means that the Persian Government will be avowedly in sympathy with the allied cause, and will exert its power in expediting the passage of a Russian force across Persia to the aid of the British, who have been defeated by the Turks in the Tigris valley.

The despatch says that Prince Firman Firza has been named Premier. He is strongly pro-Ally, and is closely connected with Russian nobility.
