Liverpool Wheat Futures Unchanged, Chicago Lower—Live Stock—Latest Quotations.

Monday Evening, Oct. 14. Liverpool wheat futures closed today unchanged, corn 1/2 higher.

CATTLE MARKETS. Cables Steady—Cattle Are Lower at Buffalo and Chicago. LONDON. Oct. 16.—London cables are firm; refrigerator beef is quoted at 1/4c to 1/2c per lb.

Toronto Junction Live Stock. TORONTO JUNCTION, Oct. 14.—Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards were 76 carloads, composed of 1,807 cattle, 5 hogs, 241 sheep, 40 calves and 1 horse.

Prices ranged from \$4.15 to \$4.75, but only one load of the latter price, the bulk selling around \$4.50 per cwt. Export bulls, \$3.25 to \$3.75.

Butchers. The best load of butchers sold at \$5 per cwt., less \$5 on the lot. Picked lots, \$4.50 to \$4.75; loads of good, \$4.40 to \$4.60; medium, \$4 to \$4.25; common, \$3.50 to \$3.75.

Feeders and Stockers. Distillery feeders in demand, Messrs. Dunn, Halligan and Lunness being on the market buying all that were available for the following prices: Steers, 100 to 1150 lbs., at \$3.25 to \$3.50; bulls at \$2.25 to \$2.50 per cwt.

Milk Cows. Fred Rowntree bought the bulk of those offered at \$38 to \$42 each, but only one bought the latter price.

Veal Calves. Veal calves sold at \$3.50 per cwt., or an average of \$3.50 per cwt. Sheep and Lambs. Export sheep sold at \$4.25 to \$4.40 per cwt.; lambs, \$3.75 per cwt.

Hogs. H. P. Kennedy reported sales at \$6.25 per cwt., but all light, thin hogs will be cut out at \$5 per cwt.

MONTREAL Live Stock. MONTREAL, Oct. 14.—(Special.)—At the Montreal Stock Yards West End Market the receipts of live stock for one week ending Oct. 12 were 426 cattle, 348 sheep and lambs, 432 hogs and 806 calves, while the offerings this morning for local consumption consisted of 140 cattle, 136 sheep and lambs, 190 hogs and 600 calves.

There has been no new developments in the cattle situation since this day week. Supplies continue to come forward very freely, which consist largely of unfinished steers, heifers and cows and choice beefs are very scarce on account of the fact that farmers will not feed them, owing to the scarcity of feed.

Receipts were for the week, as compared with previous years. The local outside demand was not so active as a week ago. Sales of choice cattle here were made at \$4 to \$6; good at \$4 to \$6; fair at \$3 to \$4; common at \$2 to \$3; and canners at \$1 to \$2 per cwt.

Supplies of sheep and lambs were fairly good and smaller than a week ago, and in consequence a stronger feeling developed in the market for the latter, which resulted in prices being advanced \$1 to \$2 per lb., but sheep values were firm and unchanged. The demand for local consumption and export trade was good. Sheep sold at \$4 to \$6, and lambs at \$3 to \$4 per lb. The demand for calves was good, of which the offerings were fair. Choice stock sold at \$12 to \$15; good at \$8 to \$10; fair at \$5 to \$7, and common at \$3 to \$4 each.

In sympathy with the stronger cable advice on Canadian bacon, and the advances in prices of 10 to 20 per cent during the past week, in all the leading European markets, a firmer feeling prevailed in the local hog situation, this morning, but prices show no change, as compared with those of a week ago, but they are a trifle higher than a week ago. Receipts were large, for which the demand was good from local dealers and packers, and trade was active, with sales of small lots at \$3.25 to \$3.50 per 100 lbs., weighed off cars.

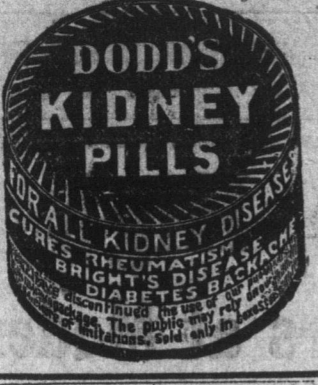
