International Bible Lesson for Tomorrow—Israel Reproved—Amos 5, 4-15.

Golden Text—"Seek ye the Lord and ye shall live."

In our lesson we find Israel's God seeking and speaking to His lost sheep, in faithfulness and love, by the heart and lips of His servant Amos the prophet, an humble, uneducated herdsman and fruit gatherer, of Zekoa, but an ambassador of Jehovah, that they may turn and seek again His face and favor.

God would have Israel repent, return and be restored, but Israel would not; they treated God then just as men treat Him to-day; they had their speculations in wheat, their pleasant vineyards, their houses of stone, their extortion, their bribery and corruptions and their religion, just as we have our wheat corners, our trusts, our breweries and distilleries and our frauds of every kind, our brown stone fronts, and our religion, yet all utter selfishness without God and without hope.

Magnificent New Equipment on Grand Trunk

The Grand Trunk have added to their passenger train equipment three new trains to be operated on the "International Limited," between Montreal, Toronto and Detroit. The trains comprise a combination baggage and passenger car, first-class coaches and cafe-parlor cars. These new creations are the acme of artistic conceptions and comfort, and are built to please the patrons of this line.

The inside is finished in Mexican mahogany with figured veneer panels. The ceilings are of Empire design with plain decorations. The seats in the passenger end are of the reversible type and upholstered in green plush. The cars are mounted on six-wheeled trucks and equipped with Westinghouse high speed brakes.

The first-class coaches are models of elegance and ease, and can seat comfortably 82 people. The interior is finished in mahogany with figured veneer panels, the Empire design also being used for the ceilings. Special designs in art glass have been used for the roof windows. The doors are glazed in specially embossed plate glass. The window shades are of pantasote with Morocco backs. Revolving fans are used in the body of the coach while in the roomy smoking compartment, one long and three short sofas accommodate the "lovers of the weed." The seats in the body of these cars are upholstered in crimson plush, and those in the smoking room are leather covered. Lavatories for ladies and gentlemen are located at either end of the cars and furnished with the latest sanitary arrangements.

A handsome Brussels carpet covers the floor in body coaches, while in the lavatories and smoking rooms linoleum is used. All these cars are lighted with Pintsch gas, and equipped for steam heat. The vestibules are of the Pullman standard; the floors are covered with rubber tiling. All the coaches are supplied with six-wheeled trucks, the exterior of the cars are painted the Grand Trunk standard—a dark bottle green, set off with a plain gold strip and scrolls and end.

The new cafe parlor cars are provided with standard Pullman steel platforms, with wide vestibules, and are mounted on six-wheeled trucks. At the end of the cars is placed the ladies' toilet, combining a wash-room, the whole being beautifully fitted up. In the next apartment the parlor is located, sumptuously carpeted with the finest Victoria-Wilton. The parlor can accommodate eleven people, there being six revolving chairs handsomely upholstered in plush, two comfortable wicker chairs, and a roomy sofa. Between the parlor and the dining room is arranged a very comfortable smoking room, with wash and toilet arrangements for gentlemen. Passing through the passage way leading from the parlor we enter the dining room, the interior of which is finished in mahogany with finely finished veneer panels. A magnificent Wilton carpet covers the floor. Accommodation for twenty-four persons is arranged for. The chairs in the dining room are upholstered in leather, and all the accessories that are necessary for a first-class dining room are supplied. Adjoining the dining room is the kitchen, wine-locker and buffet, arranged in a most compact way, with a view to the saving of space and quick serving. Altogether, these cars are a revelation of beauty, comfort and luxury, and will make travel a pleasure. All of these cars are of exceptional lengths and much more roomy than the general equipment. All of the cafe parlor cars now in operation on the Grand Trunk are equipped with the Booklovers' Library for the use of passengers free.

In addition to these new cars the Grand Trunk have increased their number of dining cars, two handsome new ones having just been turned out of the shops. The dining rooms are very large, with a seating capacity of thirty people. The cars are mounted on six-wheeled trucks, and are equipped with the Westinghouse quick action brakes. The inside finishings are of Mexican mahogany, with the exception of the kitchen, which is done in oak. The windows are supplied with silk-faced pantasote shade green with a delicate rose pattern.
