CANNING FACTORY FOR 'BURG

Wallaceburg, Jan. 13. — There are bright prospects for a canning factory being located here by the Fraser Canning Company. Their total production for 1905 was over 6,000 cases, 24 cans to the case. This year they propose canning about 20,000 cases of tomatoes, and if they decide this winter to put in machinery for canning corn, will put up from 10,000 to 20,000 cases of corn. The machinery when speeded to normal velocity, will take care of over 1,000 bushels of tomatoes each day. Their buildings will require considerable additions, which will be constructed in April and May.

THE FUNERAL QUESTION.

To the Editor The Planet:

Would you again kindly permit my intrusion on your time and space with another open letter through the G. H. J., should you deem the subject worth discussing; it is, Funerals Private or Public, which? Personally, I prefer private; it has been my duty and privilege to attend many, and I am persuaded something ought to be done to improve public funerals, and to make them a blessing to the family, the community and the church to which the deceased may belong. For instance, a greater exactness in funeral notices. If the notice stated the exact time the religious service would begin, and the exact hour the cortege would leave the house, and the minister and undertaker be exact on time, the friends of the family would know how to govern themselves and not spend an hour on the sidewalk in a cutting wind, blizzard, or winter rain, courting a gripper, pneumonia or death, as they accompany the remains to the cemetery or city hall. The lodges deem it a duty to attend a brother's funeral and have each their chaplain's and memorial services, the members are given an opportunity for a farewell look, both doors are thrown open, the house is perhaps tracked with mud and left cold as a barn. Then the health of the pall-bearers is not improved with the wind whistling through their bus, better it were entirely open or completely enclosed. Wearing the hat at the grave, and closing it after all have retired is a marked improvement. Can we improve further? Is not the custom (when sanctioned by the doctor or approval by the family) to leave the remains in the church, which the departed was a member or moral adherent, a good one? Many would then attend who would consider themselves intruders did they enter the dwelling, a man may have more real friends than he thinks. Then a flowers could go to the sick one more good before than after death, they might be dispensed with in the church. The majority of us would relish a service under comfortable circumstances, which if held on a week day, the Sunday School room would be found large enough; but if on the Lord's day the church is the place. Of course this brings up the subject of Sunday funerals, which many are not in favor of. But suppose the Sunday morning service of any of our churches was devoted to such a purpose, (the event would only be occasional), the church and family could invite all their friends. Do we not as churches welcome our volunteers and lodges at regular services? Glad to have those who are non-churchgoers with us: a break of this kind does us all good and not evil. It is often debated how to reach the masses. A Sunday funeral when properly conducted is one of God's providential ways of doing it. Collection and announcements would be no more out of place than at the visit of lodge or battalion. The minister's Sunday duties would not be increased or his working forces diminished or diverted, and he could assign the cemetery official to such a purpose. I could not help being struck with this morning's service at Park St. as so suitable for such an occasion. The sermon was from the Syrophenician woman's prayer, "Lord, help me," the hymns, anthem, solo and two, were so well suited to the farewell of a good man, and the cheering up of the sorrowing ones, and the conversion of sinners from nature to grace. Could not our lodges bring this subject up for discussion under "Good of the Order" this week and kindly let us know their judgment of this matter.
