The new Steam Gantry crane for the Lake Erie Coal Co., at Rondeau harbor, will be completed about the middle of next week and turned over to the company. The crane is a massive steel structure for the unloading of coal from boats, and will hoist four tons at a time. It cost \$50,000. The crane is equipped with a screener, which separates the coal as it passes through the hoisting machines. It is the biggest crane of the kind in Canada.
