

The late Percy-Gifkins was born in England, Dec. 25, 1849, the son of George and Fanny Gifkins, of Layton House, Harpenden. He came to Nova Scotia as a youth, and on May 1, 1871, entered the service of the old Windsor and Annapolis Railway, now a part of the D.A.R. system, as audit clerk and paymaster. For 44 years and six months from that date he was continuously in the service of the D.A.R., until his retirement on superannuation, occupying

Agent at Annapolis Royal, Dec. 1872 to Nov. 1873; agent at Richmond, 1873 to August 1875; auditor, Sept. 1875 to June 1889; auditor and general passenger agent, July 1889 to 1895; general passenger agent, Dec. 1893 to Dec. 1896; passenger traffic superintendent, Jan. 1897 to July 1897; superintendent, August 1897 to May 1900; general rananger from June 1900 to Nov. 1, 1915.
Mr. Gifkins forged his way to success entirely through native ability, hard work and close attention to duty.
He is survived only by his wife and daughter, who is the wife of L. A. Lovett, K.C., of the law firm of McIn nes, Jenks, Lovett and Macdonald, of Halifax.
