## Ranger, Last of Northern Fleet, Reaches Port

### SHIP HAILS FOR 18,000 SEALS

At 6.20 yesterday evening the sealing steamer Ranger, looking well-fished, steamed into port, her commander, Capt. Wes. Kean, hailing for 18,000 young and bedlamers seals.

The Ranger was the last ship to get clear of the ice blockade off this port at the beginning of the voyage but, taking a cut for Fogo Island, Capt. Kean struck a small patch of seals on St. Patrick's Day of which 3,500 were killed. The Ranger drifted into Green Bay with the seals and became jammed, and it was with the greatest difficulty and after the most arduous work on the part of the crew that the ship was finally freed and making her way towards White Bay where the seals were reported plentiful. The Ranger took a cut towards Hr. Deep and, in Company with the Thetis, struck the seals on April 2nd. Some 12,000 were killed and such were the ice conditions that every one of them had to be hauled to the ship. On April 17th the Ranger, with 18,000 seals on board, steamed out of White Bay and in the vicinity of the Punks struck a patch of bedlamers out of which 2,000 were secured. The ship then bore up for home and arrived at Pool's Island on Tuesday night. Capt. Kean and his crew are in the best of health and well satisfied with their trip.

## LATEST

TORONTO, Rev. Dr. R. J. Wilson, secretary of the joint committee on church union, has announced the receipt at headquarters here of a cablegram from Edinburgh, Scotland, indicating that the Eastern section of the Pan-Presbyterian Council has, through its executive, intimated that the proposed union of churches in Canada would have the right, on application, to be received as a member of that evangelical alliance of reformed churches of the world. This follows the notification some weeks ago of a similar opinion from a western section of the alliance at a meeting held at Newport News, Va., some weeks ago.

WHEELING, W. Va., May 1.—The last hope that any of the victims would be found alive vanished last night when the rescue workers penetrated the entry of number eight and found four additional bodies. Progress was halted temporarily by a curtain of water which rushed down from overhead, flooding that section of the mine. Pumps were quickly manned and officials hoped to complete exploring the entry before day-break.

## Boxing and Wrestling Tournament

There was a good attendance at the Prince's Rink last night to witness the preliminary bouts for to-morrow night's championship tournament. Owing to the fact that Raines of the lightweight class, had hurt his thumb and Brocklehurst was found to be overweight for the Bantam weights, there were no preliminary bouts in these class as was expected, but these men will appear to-morrow night. The first contest was a preliminary in the flyweight class between James 112 pounds and L. English, 110½ pounds. The conditions were three three-minute rounds. Both faced off and for the first few seconds it looked as if English would soon put an end to his opponent, but James was fighting hard and in a bout a minute he had English down for a count of eight. After this it was easy for James and he punished his opponent badly with result that he had administered a knock-out in two minutes. The next was an exhibition bout between C. LeFosse 118 pounds and J. Phelan 233 pounds this was an exhibition of first class boxing and all were sorry when the end had come. This finished the boxing and there was next an exhibition wrestling contest between Hennebury, the lightweight champion, and Adams the welterweight champion. The time limit was ten minutes and in this time some clever wrestling was witnessed. Both men tried hard to secure a fall and at times it looked as if one should result but when the time was up there was no fall registered.

For to-morrow night some very interesting boxing and wrestling matches are promised and from what was seen last night, they are sure to materialize. It is regretted that not a man can be found in St. John's to face Goodyear of Grand Falls for the heavyweight championship and the Padre Nangle belt and unless the expected entry from the Humber arrives in time, this bout will have to be scratched.
