DESERVED TRIBUTE TO HON. F. B. CARVELL

Carleton Has Lost One of Its Fore-
most Citizens by His Removal to
Ottawa—Has Been a Power
in the Public Life of the
Country—Successfully
Fought the Battles of
the People for
Many Years

Today personal notes show that at the close of last week, the Hon. F. B. Carvell ceased, for the time being at least, to be a citizen of the town of Woodstock. He has sold his house and with his family taken up permanent residence at Ottawa, according to the provisions of the law governing his office as Chairman of the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada.

Carleton County has produced many distinguished men, but none the equal of Frank Carvell either by securing his breadth of character or by the excellence of his attainments. He might have sacrificed the former for even higher yet the highest position of public favor and honor, for if he had placed self before his country when conscription was before the Commons and opposed the measure, he would without doubt have been the next premier of Canada, but at a time when the great allied powers for the world's preservation were in their worst need—when Russia had fallen, when Italy was crumbling and Britain and France were drained to the dregs in men and resources, it did not need the imagination of a prophet to know that the next six months would find the whole weight of the Teuton aggression hurled against the West. In front then Frank Carvell perceived his responsibility and sensed the path of duty. Knowing the wrath that he was about to invoke upon himself, he took the stand that his conscience directed and history will vindicate it as it has the others who had the vision of thought and the will to do so in times of national crisis.

Mr. Carvell has lived with us a good many years. He has been before the public no longer than any other man in this country, and from the day that he and Mr. Hartley formed a partnership for the practice of law in 1893 to last Saturday when he boarded the train for Ottawa, where it is, of course, been a person that could frame a single sentence detrimental to his reputation either as a private citizen or as a public servant. No Royal Commission ever was necessary to investigate his public dealings in Court of Law ever sat in judgment on his action either private or public. Certainly he was not a perfect man. He did not possess the grace necessary for a public flatterer and his hatred of wrong doing often carried him beyond average human sympathy but withal he was, gentlemanly, courteous and kind.

A democrat to the core and being in touch with men in all walks of life gave him a knowledge of detail that made him a peer at the bar in matters of evidence and a powerful and exhaustive debater of the country's affairs in the House of Commons.

Some may grumble because he has landed a responsible and lucrative office, but they should think of the years he fought successfully the battles for his party and country and the great sacrifices he has made, and after all it was not a matter of bestowing favor but a particular man, was needed for a very responsible position and when the Government of Canada sought a fair, honest and impartial administrator, they could not have found the peer of stern, unswerving upright Frank Carvell. After the ceremony a dainty supper was served and in the evening reception was held, over 100 guests being present, to whom refreshments were served by several young lady friends of the bride.

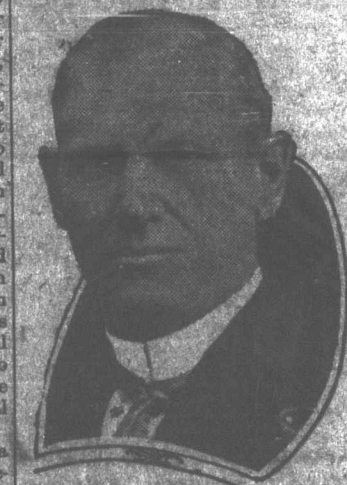
The young couple received a num-

Capt. J. D. Black, one of the best known newspapermen in the Maritime Provinces, has been chosen by the Managing Board of the New Brunswick Telephone Company, Limited to undertake the organization of a Publicity Department, which the expanding activities of the Company has made necessary.

Through the medium of its Publicity Department, the New Brunswick Telephone Company expect to be able to keep even more closely in touch with the users of the upwards of 25,000 of their telephones that are now in operation to improve the relations between the organization, its hundreds of employees and the public. "Keeping abreast of the times" is the phrase which best explains the New Brunswick Telephone Company having this new Department, and its formation indicates the progressive policy which the reconstruction period finds the Company putting into operation. Not only will the Publicity Department be an important factor in promoting the after-the-war development, but it is also expected to be the means of problems and difficulties which have to be met and overcome.

For more than fifteen years past "Doug" Black has been on the News Staff of The Gleaner in Fredericton, and during that time he has had a varied experience in all branches of the Editorial Department of newspaper work. He has also been correspondent at the Capital for a number of Canadian and American newspapers and was for years Official Reporter of the New Brunswick Legislature.

He has taken an active part in Sporting activities at Fredericton. He was the executive head of the original Fredericton Baseball Club, which was formed in 1911, and organized the famous "Pens," who won three successive championships of the New Brunswick & Maine League. He was Manager of the Fredericton Trotting Park for several years, having organized the Maritime Racing Circuit when it had been one of its most successful periods in 1910, and he was a member of the Executive which brought the Capitals to Fredericton in 1908, when the city yearned for a Hockey Championship.

When the McLean Highlanders were organized by Lt. Col. Percy A. Guthrie in 1916, Captain Black was appointed Quartermaster of that unit and he was in charge of

Near Hartland Speak Volumes

From the looks of the advertisement of G. Murray McLeod he is out to do some business. A few weeks ago he bought the lot between the Hartland Clothing Co., and J. Clark & Son and a few days ago he sold the property to the Clothing Company. This firm intend to build an attractive cement block building on it soon as spring opens up. The lot has 39 feet street frontage and runs to the river. A building on this vacant lot will surely add much to the appearance of that portion of the town.

During recent days Mr. McLeod has purchased the Charles Gillin property, lock, stock and barrel, on De-
not street. This includes a street frontage of about 60 feet, and is one of the most desirable business locations in town. The two wooden buildings house a barber shop, a meat shop and two jewelry stores, besides tenements upstairs. Mr. McLeod will sell all or part of this property.

Alexander Thompson of Windsor has purchased the well known Haley farm at Lower Wakefield.

New Lumber Enterprises

Coun. Fred W. Smith who with his brother Henry Smith has been running a mill at Coldstream for the past few years, have dissolved that business and Coun. Smith's son Roy has entered in co-partnership with Earl Belyea and have moved the machinery from Coldstream to Lower Brighton and are rebuilding at Tedlie's siding. This mill will be ready for operation in about a month and will cut long and short, soft and hard wood lumber. Throughout the winter they will employ about 20 hands.

Coun. F. W. Smith and Wood Tompkins of Arundale has entered into partnership and bought the Smith & Perley saw mill at Upper Woodstock and moved it to a location one mile south of Arundale Road Station on the Valley railway and will there run a general saw mill business.
