

The annual egg product per hen, in this country, ranges from three to eight dozen each.

Now this is by far too small. There is no earthly reason why every hen that lays at all, heald not be made to lay from ten to fifteen dozen eyes each per year, and continue to do dozen eggs each per year, and continue to do so for at least five years. We know of parties who get eggs at that rate in mid-winter in our cold climate.
