

RUSHBROOK FOUND GUILTY

Of Shooting With Intent to Kill Miss Davis.

Foxey Smith Pleads Guilty and is Remanded.

Mondingo Prince Needs Money to Get Him Free.

There were many cases at the Police Court this morning, but they were hustled through in order to clear the courtroom for the school trustee nominations. Harry Rushbrook, 61 Vine street, was found guilty of shooting at Agnes Davis, 106 King street east, with intent to kill. He was remanded for sentence by the Magistrate, who stated that he could give him a term of one week to life imprisonment. The complainant, who gave her story last Tuesday, when the prisoner first came up, was not called, but George Harris and his wife, who have rooms in the same house, were sworn. They both stated that they heard a row going on in the Davis apartments, and that they heard Rushbrook threaten to "finish the whole lot," himself included. Robert Davis, a brother of Agnes, told a similar story of the threats, and said that the defendant pointed the revolver at him and he took it away from him. The complainant, a constable Elliott, who arrested Rushbrook, said he was called in by Miss Davis, who was shouting murder, and he found Davis and Rushbrook fighting. He produced a bottle which held a half ounce of chloroform, and said he found it in Rushbrook's pocket. The prisoner then took the stand. He said he had been going around with Agnes Davis for some time, and that last Monday night he met her and she "turned him down." He bought a bottle of chloroform immediately, and then went for his revolver, meaning, he said, to kill himself on her doorstep. He said he had been drinking for some time, and was on the verge of the "jim-jams" and out of his mind. He was not going to shoot Agnes, he said, but only intended to shoot himself. The Magistrate said that there were too many people heard him threaten and he would have to find him guilty. Foxey Smith and his pal, Charles Yates, 108 Catharine street north, were charged with being vagrants and there was a further charge of carrying a revolver against Foxey. Since his last visit to Hamilton this notorious man has died his hair a dark brown, but he admitted his identity. He pleaded guilty to both charges and Yates, who was charged with vagrancy, pleaded not guilty. The Chief asked for a remand till Friday, which was granted. S. Kerr applied for bail in Yates' case but the Chief would not agree, and the Magistrate refused.

J. R. CAMERON DEAD

Editor of the Spectator Called Unexpectedly.

A death which will cause profound regret, especially in the local newspaper world, is that of Mr. John Robson Cameron, editor of the Spectator, which occurred at his home in East Flamboro during last night. The event was quite unexpected. Mr. Cameron had been at his post at the Spectator up to the close of the past week, and appeared to be in his usual health. Upon leaving the office for the day he went to Dr. McCallum's office to pay an account. The doctor was surprised to find him a very sick man, sitting beside the business upon which he called, at once made an examination. He advised Mr. Cameron to go home and remain very quiet, and also cautioned members of the family, but without saying anything to alarm him. He drove home and went to bed. Yesterday he had a stroke of apoplexy, and about 9 o'clock last night he passed away. John Robson Cameron was a Canadian, born at Perth, on April 19, 1843. He was educated at Brockville and Quebec, and served in the newspaper profession when a young man. In 1889, at the age of 45, he came to Hamilton to take the position of city editor of the Spectator, and has been with that paper ever since, except six months which he spent in Mississippi as editor of the Tribune in 1884. When the late Mr. McCullum left the Spectator to become collector of customs Mr. Cameron was made managing editor, and, 14 years ago, when Mr. A. T. Freed retired to become inspector of meat, Mr. Cameron succeeded as editor in chief. Deceased was a member of the Canadian volunteers in 1866, and went to the front at the time of the Fenian raid. He was also a member of the first Red River expedition, with the First Ontario Rifles, under Colonel Wolsey, in 1870. Although of somewhat of a gruff exterior, Mr. Cameron was a man of warm heart and gentle disposition, and no man could have been kinder in his home or more devoted to those with whom he came in personal contact. As a writer he was keen and forceful, and went direct to the point in a telling way. Mr. Cameron is survived by a widow and family of ten, four sons and six daughters. The sons are: Archie, second assistant chief of the Hamilton Fire Department; John, Rankin and Gordon. The last mentioned is a student at Queen's, but is at home now for the holidays. Two of the daughters are married and the other four are at home. He is a member of Court Cromwell, tekkah, I. O. F., and of Kanawha Council, Royal Arcanum. Tribute From Whitney. Toronto, Dec. 30.—(Special)—"I am very much shocked to hear of his sudden death," remarked Hon. Mr. Whitney, the Prime Minister, when told of the death of Mr. John Robson Cameron, editor of the Hamilton Spectator, this morning. "I think it is unquestionably a very great loss to the press, and consequently to the country. When I say this, I am not unmindful of his great services to the Conservative party from time to time, the value of which has been appreciated by those cognizant of them."
