

VARIETIES.

EARTHQUAKE AT CALABRIA.—The intelligence received of an earthquake in this Province is of the most painful character. Calabria is subject to earthquakes: a most terrific visitation of this sort occurred in 1783, which swallowed up many towns and villages. In some portions of the Province there are traces of former volcanoes, and the soil is one mass of lava. Calabria is at the southern extremity of Italy, and forms what is called the foot of the Italian boot.

CHINESE FUNERAL.—Quite a singular sight, in the way of a Chinese funeral, took place in the city yesterday morning. The deceased must have been a person of some note and standing among his countrymen, judging from the length and character of the funeral procession. The hearse was magnificently decked with waving plumes of black, and immediately following it was a carriage in which some Chinese musicians who were discoursing music, which to their ears might have seemed very soft and solemn, but which struck us as horribly harsh and discordant. Eight or ten other carriages, filled with Chinese, followed, and the train was brought up by a carriage in which some more musicians were seated, making terrible sounds on gongs, and sticks of wood, and cymbals, in which neither time nor tune seemed at all to be considered.—[California paper]

LEECHES.—Some one has discovered, that leeches, when drunk, will bite until sober; and, therefore, when they show a disinclination to bite, he makes them drunk; he puts them into a little warm beer, and directly they begin to kick about, he takes them out, holds them in a cloth, applies them, and finds that they will bite immediately and vigorously. This is one of the very few cases we (Household Words) have met with, of a personage being more useful when drunk than when sober. The surgeons at the Hotel Dieu, at Paris, are said to be a little more delicate in their practice; they intoxicates their sluggish leeches with a little warm wine and water, instead of beer.

CAUSE OF THE FERTILITY OF THE PLAINS OF BABYLON.—Gypsum beds, says Mr. Williams, stretch from four hours above Mosul many miles down the river, furnishing by their yearly wash the richest possible deposit for the plains of Babylon, and fully accounting for the otherwise incredible reports of their fertility, as given by Herodotus. For thousands of years the Tigris has annually transported and spread this "dressing" over those regions free of charge, and were they now thoroughly irrigated, as in the days of the energetic Nebuchadnezzar, they might again be the granary of the world.

PROPHCY AND THE EASTERN WAR.—The author of "The Coming Struggle" has published another book, in which he says, that the summary of events in Russia's mission and destiny, as reduced from prophecy, is the following:—"1st. He wrests a portion of the Assyro-Macedonian territory from Turkey, and becomes 'king of the north.' 2d. He overthrows the Turkish power, takes possession of Constantinople, and becomes the 'dragon.' 3d. He conquers the continental nations, and becomes 'Gog of Magog.'" Pope and Popish system are to disappear. Napoleon the Third is to die the death of all usurpers. Austria is to fall like a rotten branch. Nicholas is to reign over all the nations of Europe as 'Gog and Magog,' but "he attempts the conquest of Syria and India, and is destroyed with all his hosts, in the valley of Jehoshaphat, near Jerusalem."

THE EDITOR.—The (Richmond Mail) throws off the following capital illustration:—"They have a steamboat in the Western waters by the name of 'The Editor.' This is the best name ever yet given to a Mississippi steamboat. We are surprised it was never thought of before. The editor is a working engine, whose fires are going day and night. Now he sails against the tide, and now with it, going along at a dashing rate, until suddenly he comes up, all standing, against some hidden snag, which nearly shivers his timbers to pieces. Whenever he moves, he puts the waters in agitation for a time, and leaves a wake of troubled waves behind him, which lasts about five minutes. He serves everybody but himself, carries freight and passengers in any quantity, and goes (puff-puffing) down the stream of life. Often his powers are overtaken, and the boiler bursts; but fortunately it kills no one, but himself, and who cares for an Editor?"
