C.N.R. Police Make Haul at Napadogan

Fredericton, Feb. 24—Word reached here this afternoon that detectives in the employ of the Canadian National Railways had made a big haul of railway employees at Napadogan on the National Transcontinental route, who were charged with stealing merchandise from freight cars.

Local officials of the C. N. R. confirmed the report, but the only particulars they were able to give was that a dozen or more persons, said to be largely employees of the railway, had been arrested and were being brought to Fredericton this evening.

The arrests are the culmination of investigations which have been going on for some time as the result of large quantities of goods of various kinds being stolen while in transit via the Transcontinental route, including merchandise for shipment overseas from the ports of St. John and Halifax.

Trial of the prisoners will be held in Fredericton. Word that the C. N. R. police officers headed by Chief Inspector Paige had made a big haul of railway employees at Napadogan or vicinity was received in Moncton yesterday. Last evening railway authorities confirmed the reports stating that nine employees had been placed under arrest, and further that as a result of their investigations about twenty or twenty-five employees, including the nine arrested, would likely be dismissed. It is understood that in the number are included a number of Napadogan roundhouse employees, car checkers, car inspectors and also two operators. It is learned that merchandise of all grades was discovered in the hands of those arrested. In one particular case it is alleged that a large keg of liquor was found, the same having been on the missing list for two years.

Among the officers who assisted in the investigation were Inspectors Dunphy, Lawson and Trenholm.

Notice is hereby given that application will be made to the Local Legislature at its next session for an Act to amend the Town Incorporation Act in respect to The Town of Newcastle.

The purpose of the said Act are to provide:

(1) That the Aldermen of the Town of Newcastle be elected for the term of two years;

(2) That for the purpose of making the proposed change the four aldermen receiving the largest number of votes in the Town Election in April next shall serve for two years, and the remaining four aldermen for one year only, and that thereafter four aldermen shall be elected annually for two years;
