MARITIME SUMMER SCHOOL

Closed August 15th, 1925

The Maritime Summer School

Mount Allison University Sackville,

N. B. closed on Saturday, August 15.

The session has lasted six weeks and

has been most successful. During

the same period the Provincial

Vocational School for the training

of teachers has been in session, and

the students of both schools, one

hundred and twenty in all have

boarded in the University Residence.

In the University school ninety

were registered, divided among the

Provinces as follows:—

New Brunswick 50

Nova Scotia 28

Prince Edward Island 4

Elsewhere 3

The great majority are teachers

While the most of them came

primarily to take University subjects

such as Science, Mathematics, Latin

and French, almost all registered for

some course dealing directly with

the work of teaching.

About forty teachers took the

courses given by Dr. Amoss in Edu-

cational Psychology, General Psychol-

ogy and Methods in Primary and

Kindergarten Work. All claim these

courses were helpful beyond expecta-

tion.
