

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations. Any person who is the sole head of s amily, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of

Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain onditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending Duties-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live

farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father mother, son, daughter, brother or sis In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter

within nine miles of his homestead on
