

CATTLE AND SHEEP

Huron Live Stock Association Annual Sale.

The annual sale of thoroughbred and improved stock, under the auspices of the Huron Live Stock Association, was held in Clinton, on Wednesday last. This annual sale has now become one of the permanent institutions of the county, and, although even yet many difficulties and discouragements have to be contended with, we have every confidence that it will, year by year, grow in favor. Upon the whole, we can safely say that the sale of Wednesday was the most successful that has yet been made. Scarcely an animal offered now remains unsold. The sales made in the ring and under the hammer can not be taken as an index of the amount of stock which really changes hands, as it frequently occurs, as we believe was the case on Wednesday, that more stock was sold privately than by auction. Strange as it may seem, it is nevertheless a fact that animals which are withdrawn from the ring at a certain price are bought up before they leave the ground, even at higher figures. So that one of the greatest advantages of this annual gathering is the bringing of buyers and sellers together, and the opportunity which it affords purchasers of comparing the stock of different breeders. In this way, probably, fully as much good is accomplished to both buyer and breeder as is done by the actual sales made under the auctioneer's hammer, although the one seems to be a necessary accompaniment of the other. The following is a statement of the business done at this sale on Wednesday:—(Gladstone, a two year old heavy draught, imported stallion, the property of Mr. John Mason, was bid in at \$1200. John Oakes, a bull calf, sold to Wm. Stanley, Goderich t.p. for \$75; Earl of Mar, calved Nov. 30, 1881, bred by Thos. Russell, Uxbridge, purchased by Jas. McLean, Tuckersmith, for \$175; Duke of Elmhurst, 21, calved Oct. 8th, 1881, bred by Wm. Higgins, Stanley, bid in at \$400; Prince of the North, calved Dec. 18th, 1881, bred by Snell & Sons, bought by Mr. G. Moffatt, Turnberry, for \$250; Miss Booth, a heifer, calved April 21, 1881, bred by Snell & Sons, bought by Mr. Robt. McCulloch, Goderich township, for \$150; Lady Flora, a heifer, calved Jan. 19th, 1881, bred by G. Middleton, bid in at \$150; Miss Booth, twin, a three year old heifer, bred by Mr. A. Elcoat, Tuckersmith, bought by Mr. G. Gill, Fullarton, for \$50; Stanley Chief, a three year old bull, owned by Mr. Wm. Pearson, Stanley, bid in at \$130; Miss Bates, twin, a three year old heifer, bred by Mr. Elcoat, bought by Mr. T. P. Harris, Fullarton, for \$125; Duke of Elmhurst, 3d, a yearling calf, bred by Mr. Higgins, bought by Mr. Armstrong, of Lambton, for \$200; Third Prince of Seaham, calved Dec. 24th, 1881, bred by Snell & Sons, bid in at \$255; Duke of Harlock, three years old, the property of Thos. Neilans, Hullett, bought by Mr. John McMillan, Hullett, for \$80; Mary Ann, an aged cow, the property of Wm. Cooper, Tuckersmith, bid in at \$75; Snowdrop, an aged cow, the property of Mr. Elcoat, bought by Mr. Wm. Pearson, Stanley, for \$110; Crimdon Duke, 2d, the property of Mr. Elcoat, bid in at \$100; Prince Alfred, a yearling calf, bred by Wm. Cooper, bid in at \$60. Sheep were not in good demand, and bidding was somewhat slow. Cotswold shearing rams brought from \$19 to \$25, and ram lambs of the same breed from \$9 to \$12, and ewes averaged from \$15 to \$20 per pair. In Leicester, one aged ram was sold for \$29, and a ram lamb for \$16, and other sales in this line of sheep were about the same. An aged pig sold for \$15. Mr. J. P. Brine, of this town, acted as auctioneer, and gave entire satisfaction both to the Association and the owners of the stock sold.—[Expositor.]
