Other questions there may be that are likely to crop up, but all fade into insignificance when compared with the issue presented in Tariff Reform.

Our townsman, Mr F. W. JOHNSTON, has been appointed junior Judge of West Algoma, and will leave for the "So", where he will hereafter reside, on or about the 1st of July. He was an ardent politician in his day, but now, having sought "the seclusion that an office grants," will forsake the vanities of the political world and henceforth devote his time and talents to severing legal Gordian knots for the litigious Algomans.

Now would be an excellent time for the Equal Rights Association of Toronto to establish branches of their society in West Huron. During the contest recently closed nearly every Tory in the Riding professed to be enamoured of "Equal Rights, and if they were not "foxing" there is an excellent field here for the formation of several thriving branches to ripen for action by the next Dominion election.

MOWAT'S majority is still going up. Last week, as we showed, he had nineteen of a majority; since that time a recount has been had in the Prince Edward county election and SRAAGUE, the Liberal, has been declared elected. This change will increase Mowat's majority to 21 on a division. East Hastings and two or three other counties have yet to be heard from, which may give the majority a further upward tendency.

A CHANGE is announced in the editorial management of the Globe. Mr J. S. Willison, a former resident of Huron, will become managing editor after July 1st, and Mr EDWARD FARRER, the most gifted leader writer in Canada, will take a place on the staff as chief editorial writer. We congratulate Messrs WILLISON and FARRER upon having an opportunity afforded them of putting their undoubted talents to the best possible use, and the Globe is also to be congratulated on having secured the services of two such clever journalists.

In last week's Star some nameless creature attempted to deny a statement made by Mr Mc GILLICUDDY on the evening of election day, that during the recent contest in West Huron the local Tory stumpers showed the white feather so far as attending Reform meetings was concerned, except on one occasion, while the Reform cause had a representative at every one of the listed Conservative meetings where opposition was invited, save one. Will the editor of the Star or some responsible person over his own signature dare make such a denial? It is all very well for Mr Nobson from Colborne to send a bogus statement of that kind to the Star, but if he dare put his name to a repetition of the denial this questioning at issue or anything else, this quaking behind a hedge and throwing missiles at an opponent in the open is not a very creditable act for so "pious" a professor as the Star's correspondent from Colborne.

The Star last week stated that a friend of the SIGNAL's carried a green flag around the Square recently. For the information of the Star and its readers we now state that no friend of the SIGNAL's was ever guilty of such tomfoolery. The SIGNAL is not the organ of the rag, flag and bobtail party.
