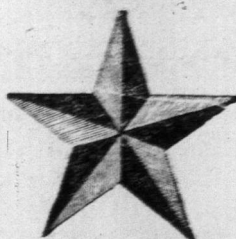

### Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram.

OTTAWA, Oct. 3.  
Hon. George Foster, who is again  
on the way to England for another  
month's stay on Imperial business,  
will next year have his headquarters  
established permanently there. Foster  
it is said, is slated to fill the office  
of Canada's Imperial Minister, which  
is a proposal to Foster's scheme for  
more direct representation by Canada  
in Imperial affairs at London. It is  
understood the suggestion has been  
made directly to Foster that he be-  
come Canada's diplomatic agent and  
general representative, with a salary  
of \$75,000 a year. The present scheme  
is to extend the scope and importance  
of the High Commissioner's office by  
giving it semi-diplomatic and advisory  
or consultative functions in relation  
to the Imperial Government as a pre-  
liminary to Canada's larger repre-  
sentation in the American "Council."  
Meanwhile these are being completed  
for the purchase of a site for a mag-  
nificent Canadian office in London, to  
be situated near Westminster Abbey,  
and work on the new building will  
begin next year.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Oct. 3.  
No ultimatum has been delivered to  
Turkey from the four Balkan States,  
but according to the most reliable  
news such an ultimatum will be pre-  
sented at Constantinople. It will de-  
mand autonomy for Macedonia, Al-  
bania, old Serbia and Crete within  
three days, and in the event of Tur-  
key's failure to comply with their de-  
mand the Balkan coalition will report  
to the Great Powers at the same  
time addressing a collective note no-  
tifying them that after the expiration  
of another three days the Balkan  
States will enforce their demand by  
recourse to arms. Thus there will be  
a respite of a week before hostilities  
open. This respite will be utilized by  
the Powers to seek to arrange a com-  
promise with Turkey acceptable to the  
four Balkan States, which it is be-  
lieved would prefer a war out, without  
bloodshed. No further news has been  
received of frontier movements, but  
the tension continues extreme, espe-  
cially owing to the seizure by Turkish  
authorities of Greek vessels and the  
issuance of orders by the Turkish war  
ministry for the mobilization of the  
Turkish army. The committee of union  
and progress has proclaimed its whole-  
hearted support of the Government in  
defence of the empire. Thirty thou-  
sand Albanians, through their chiefs,  
have informed the Government of  
their readiness to undertake any ser-  
vice in defence of the Fatherland.  
Similar patriotic devotion is being dis-  
played by all classes.

will proceed to Edinburgh and will

### Newfoundland "Quarterly."

We have read with much interest

the story of his visit to Egypt and the  
Pyramids. Rose M. Greene con-  
tributes some verses. Mr. C. O'Neill con-  
tributes the story of the Columbus Memorial  
at Washington and the unveiling cere-  
monies last June. Richard S. Dahl  
continues his collection of the Lore of  
Piscaria Bay. There are also other  
articles, a tribute to the late Hugh  
H. Fraser, verse by R. G. MacDonald,  
life in the Outports by M. J. Collins, an  
article on Peat and a short story. The  
number is very readable.
