over Easter. Since the opening date,
a most determined fight has been put
up against the Spend-Thrift policy of
the Morris Government, with a cor-
responding increase of consternation
in the Tory ranks. Every sitting has
added to the Hazard for future cir-
culation throughout the Colony,
damaging evidence in the people's

compelled with. We are, however,
still very much in the dark as to the
future intentions of the Government.

is making good," has proved a verita-
ble boomerang for the Plenic Party.
The people know how Morris has
made good for himself and his mas-
ters. The patriot or Plenic Chief,

wants the people to believe that he is
working for nothing. Yet Seven
thousand dollars are not sufficient to

Hague Tribunal.If Morris made good on this fishery

go until we get his final bill and that

closes. If any benefit resulted from
the decision of the judges of this Tri-

country. Before he assumed office all
the questions were in shape for ap-
plication. The most arduous part of
the work had been done by Kent, the
Bond Attorney General. The pleas-
ant picnic part was taken up by Mor-
ris in his attempt "to make a good"
picnic. Another difficult portion of
the work, the preparation of the case
and the argument before the Tribunal,
was assigned to the late Sir J. S.
Winter. Other distinguished legal
gentlemen who had an active part in
the Newfoundland case were the En-
glish Attorney General and Counsel and
the Canadian Counsel Mr. Alan
Aylesworth.We have seen that Mr. Kent, Sir J.
S. Winter, Sir Robert Finlay and Sir
Alan Aylesworth did the principal
work in connection with Newfound-
land's case. What did Sir Edward
Morris and the Hon. Donald Morison
do to justify the large payments of
Seven Thousand Dollars each, made
to them by the Government and the
people, equally large payments con-
templated in the future?
If Morris or Morison made good in
this respect, is it not about time Mc-
Grath should inform a waiting public.
It is the latter who paid the piper;
they, who paid such extravagant
sums for this Hague picnic and they
would like to know the services per-
formed. Of one thing they are as-
sured, both these picnicers, made
good for themselves.Morison, not satisfied with making
good on fees, did extremely good
work for himself and company when
he became the owner of 13 millions of
acres of timber rights on the Labra-

SALONIKA, To-day.
The assassin of King George is still
in close confinement. At various
periods he was forced to undergo ex-
amination, but without eliciting any
facts to show that other persons were
implicated in the crime. Schines is
not a madman, but apparently a weak
minded. He lived by begging. Three
weeks ago he came to Salonika by way
of Athens. He stopped for a few days
at Volo Thessaly, where he delivered
harrangues in which he declared that
in a short time he would succeed in
establishing equality; there would be
no longer either rich or poor work
which was now accomplished in one
hour would be spread out over two.
Interrogated as to why he assassinated
the King, Schines replied: "I had to
do somehow, as I suffered from neur-
asthenia, therefore, I wished to re-
deem my life." He appears to have
led a wretched existence, subsisting
almost entirely on milk. His family
had long ceased to acknowledge him.
Schines was for a time instructor in
the Medical department of a Univer-
sity in Athens. He refuses to give
any explanation for his crime beyond
the fact that two years ago he ap-
plied for assistance at the Palace, and
was driven away by an aide de camp.
Constantine will take the oath as King
of Hellenes on Friday. The hope ex-
pressed is that the King will be pro-
claimed as Constantine XI. The last
Byzantine Emperor having been Con-
stantine XI. The Chamber of Deputies
will be summoned to take the oath of
fidelity to the King, after which the
Ministry will resign.

NEW YORK, To-day.

Four hundred women and children
hopped in the automobile of Dr.
Friedman this afternoon, begging him
to treat them for tuberculosis. The
crowd surrounded the German physi-
cian outside the Hospital for Deformi-
ties of Joint diseases, and a squad of
police reserves had to be called to
make a path for him to the hospital
door. Physicians from all parts of the
States, earlier in the day, gathered at
Mount Sinai Hospital to watch Dr.
Friedman administer his vaccine, but
were refused admission. The only
medical men at the clinic were three
representatives of the Government, at
whose request other physicians were
excluded. The Hospital authorities
explained that the Government physi-
cians feared premature reports from the
clinic would be made before they pre-
sented their official report to the
Government. Friedman, it was said,
had not made any request to have the

**Railroading
Legislation.**ARTICLE IN YESTERDAY'S TELE-
GRAM READ IN THE HOUSE BY
THE PREMIER.Before the Assembly adjourned last
evening, Mr. Morison, the Minister of
Justice, cut out from the Telegram
and handed the Premier our article,
headed "Railroading Legislation." The
Prime Minister read it for the House,
said that the Legislature had always
sat Holy Week (which we doubt),
said there was no intention of rail-
roading legislation, as no night sit-
tings were held yet, and that every
facility was given for discussion of
measures before the House, and that
this session would be a long one. He
would welcome Sir Robert Bond,
when he returned, and believed the
members of the Opposition had no
connection with the article he had
read. Reading the article in the
'News' this morning, one would im-
agine that the Premier had immedi-
ately donned his war paint and got
after the Telegram with his bravos
behind him, and that our political
and journalistic scapels were in dan-
ger. As a matter of fact, Sir Ed-
ward's references were very temper-
ate, and we believe he feels not near-
ly as sore over the matter as our
friend the 'News.' The Premier's
utterances merely amounted to a
mild protest. As for ourselves and
for the public, it is not enough to
point to recent scenes in the Assem-
bly for justification of our observa-
tions? For hours daily, have not the
Opposition been engaged pointing out
unwarranted proceedings and gross
irregularities in the Estimates, which
show (as they have demonstrated),
that \$70,000 of the people's money
have been spent without Legislative
Authority. Is not this wasting the**Wait.**Mostly everybody has heard favor-
