Torbay Welcomes Liberals!

KENT, DWYER and RYAN STORMED THE DISTRICT—ALL TORY HOPES ABANDONED.

Before a thronged and enthusiastic gathering, the East End Liberal candidates, Messrs. Kent, Dwyer and Ryan, held a meeting in the Total Abstinence Hall, Torbay, last night and judging by the enthusiasm that prevailed it is clearly evident the days of the Tories are numbered.

The expression that "Bond Can't Lose," seems to have travelled throughout the island like a cyclone, and is seriously realized by the people, too, especially in the settlement of Torbay, where the watchword is on the lips of every voter.

The meeting was called to order by the veteran Mr. Jesse Gosse, who acted as Chairman, and who in brief but well chosen remarks, impressed upon all present to give their support to the men who would look after the welfare of the people best—

and that was the Liberal Party. He then introduced as the first speaker Mr. Chas. Ryan, who was so favorably known to every workingman in the community. He was vigorously applauded. Mr. Ryan arose and expressed himself as heartily thankful for the reception given himself and colleagues, especially to the ladies who were present. He was one of the candidates representing the good old Liberal Party and came as such to seek the suffrages of the people in the forthcoming election. The desire of the Liberal Party is to uplift the fishermen, laborer and the farmer who make for the prosperity of the country. He intimated that the main idea of the party led by Sir Robert Bond, was for the advancement of our fishermen in every respect. He also stated that his party had allied itself with the Fishermen's Protective Union, under the Presidency of Mr. W. F. Coaker, who has accomplished such a great deal for the reduced cost of living for the fishermen. He showed how our public monies are wasted by the present Government and gave as an illustration the Agricultural Society in charge of men, who know as much about a potato as a canker that's in it. After an able address he stated that if elected to represent the people of Torbay, in the Legislature he would leave no stone unturned to further their interests; again the speaker appealed to his hearers to vote the straight ticket for Kent, Dwyer and Ryan.

The next speaker was Mr. John Dwyer, whose very appearance evoked considerable enthusiasm. "Victory all along the line" and "Bond Can't Lose," is the main subject of talk heard so far during our campaign, said Mr. Dwyer, and he was assured that Torbay would again come to the fore and stand nobly by the Liberal flag. Referring to the

roads, Mr. Dwyer said that they were never in such a wretched condition as they are at the present time. He then unravelled the Tory Agricultural policy or better known as the "huge cod" which was substituted for the Experimental Stations and Farm established by Sir Robert Bond. Did not the present Government introduce the potato canker which is as dangerous to public health as any contagious disease. In effective style the speaker showed how Downey, the Agricultural expert (for getting Government pay) Cashin and Piccott were given health trips abroad at the Colony's expense. Mr. Dwyer showed in other ways how our monies are being squandered and, in conclusion advised his hearers not to listen to any false cries, but to consider the policies at issue of both parties and then vote as their consciences dictated.

Mr. Kent, the leader of the team, then arose to speak amid tumultuous cheering. Consider, gentlemen, he said, which party has conserved the interests of this country best and then vote accordingly. In 1894 when the Tory Government was in power this country was dragged into a ruinous and hopeless financial state. The commercial community was completely wrecked and the consequence was that the Liberal Party was called to take control of affairs and adjust the difficulties that surrounded us on every hand. Sir Robert Bond, who proved himself a capable statesman, was chosen to strengthen our finances and he went abroad and succeeded in saving the country from disaster and starvation. For three years the Ship of State went along on an even keel, until 1897 when the Tory Party went to the country without any policy—like the present Tory Party—but the cry that a "change" was wanted. The result was that the Tories came back to power, but before three years had expired they

had to be bundled out and our greatest statesman Sir Robert Bond was again called to the front and he again succeeded in saving the country. The Liberal Party then took control and carried on successfully until 1909 when the people were once more hood-winked by another catch cry, resulting in the Tory Government. The result was Morris, getting into power. What do we find to-day but that the public debt of the Colony has increased abnormally within the past four and a half years, showing that the present Government as well as other Tory Parties, were not true to the trust placed in them. Morris introduced the construction of railroads. In 1910 he told in the House of Assembly that he would build five railways at a cost of four million dollars. These railroads are yet under construction and an additional two millions of dollars have been spent and before they are completed will cost this country

Upwards of Twelve Millions of Dollars. Therefore, the Conclusion arrived at is that Sir Edward Morris either did not know what he was doing, or with ill will deliberately deceived the electorate.

Speaking of the revenue of the country as it stands to-day, Mr. Kent showed to the fishermen that every second fish taken out of the water, had to go for revenue purposes. To show the lavish expenditure of the present Government, that besides a revenue of four millions

\$2,500,000 was borrowed, and yet the Public Debt increased Ten Millions of Dollars during the Past Four Years.

Consider, these matters, said the speaker, before deciding how to vote. Have we adequate returns for the amount of money spent? That is the main point at issue. Some of the ways our public monies are squandered are on picnics abroad and on coastal contracts given to members of the Government. For instance the two spurs that were purchased for twenty-eight dollars and sold to the Government for two thousand, two hundred dollars.

Agricultural Policy. Mr. Kent showed very lucidly the enormous amount of money outrageously squandered on the useless Agricultural methods of the present Government.

The Fisheries. The total value of our exports last year amounted to thirteen millions of dollars. Ten of Which was the Product of Our Fisheries. Is not this Sufficient Proof that the Mainstay of the Colony are the Fisheries, and Why Should they not be Developed Properly?

The F.P.U. inaugurated here is a great benefit to fishermen. The Union is as good to the fishermen and as beneficial as other unions throughout the country are to other workmen. The policy of the Liberal Party is to benefit the fishermen and the masses, but the Tory Party cannot say that. The many acts passed in the Legislature in the interests of the workmen are proof of that. Take the Workman's Compensation

Act introduced into the Assembly by Mr. Kent himself.

The speaker denounced the rumors that were circulated for political purposes in the outlying settlements of St. John's East concerning the F.P.U. The Union knows no Class or Creed, and is the best friend that the Fishermen of Newfoundland have. Repeatedly there are complaints from the fishermen when there is no bait, which very often means a loss to the fishermen. The F.P.U. has the main policies in Sir Robert Bond's Manifesto, is to erect Bait Depots and place the bait exactly where the fishermen want it. Other questions of vital importance are the marketing of fish and standardizing of cull. Sir Robert Bond will also adopt measures whereby in future fishermen will get proper prices for their fish, with no illegitimate profit to purchasers. Mr. Kent then gave a scathing criticism of the nonsensical Selling Process or insane system, adopted by the Tory Government, whereby a fisherman was expected to send his fish to market in a paper bag.

Old Age Pensions. This is another important matter that Sir Robert Bond has given careful consideration to and will make ample provision for the worn-out toiler. The speaker then announced that a report was going around that members of a certain creed were not allowed to join the F. P. U. Earnest and effectively Mr. Kent impressed upon his hearers that such was false, that the wilful lie was circulated for political ends. To endorse his statement he produced a document which was read also showing that no attempt had been made by the F.P.U. to injure our educational system. The Evening Herald was the origin of the sectarian cry, meant entirely to deceive the people. In closing, Mr. Kent asked those at the meeting to consider the policies and doings of both Governments and he had no doubt, that when Polling Day comes round, Torbay will stand by the old Liberal Party, which has helped Newfoundland in her darkest hours, and vote the straight ticket for Kent, Dwyer and Ryan. Following the singing of the National Anthem the meeting closed with ringing cheers for Sir Robert Bond and the Liberal Party.

THOUGHTFUL ACT. On the way back to town the Liberal candidates and supporters were given a hearty welcome by the Tory leaders, who, recognizing their inferiority in the fight, assembled near the
