Fishery Reports.

July 25.—From T. McCarthy, (Renew to Seal Cove).—The total catch is 1040 quintals and for last week 109. Twelve traps, 22 dories, 23 skiffs and 10 boats are fishing. Prospects are very poor. There was some caplin for bait but no codfish all the week, until Saturday evening when there was a little sign for traps. Hook and line men are doing nothing.

July 1st. From C. Renouf (Bank Head to Highlands).—The lobster fishery is a blank. Codfishery prospects are not very good and the total catch is 1427 quintals with 300 for last week. Five traps are in the water and 65 dories fishing. Herring is obtainable in small quantities for bait.

July 25.—From B. Perry, (Catalina, Northern Head to Southern Head).—No bankers or schooners from the grounds have arrived. There is plenty of caplin bait, but codfishery prospects are very poor. The fishing with nets was very good the latter part of the week and there was an occasional haul with traps. Seventy-six traps and 43 dories and skiffs are fishing. The lobster fishery is very poor.

July 25th.—From Fortune (Carmel).—No traps are out but 55 dories and skiffs and 1 boat are fishing. No bankers have arrived. The shore fishery continues poor. The total catch is 648 quintals and for last week 65. Caplin are plentiful. Only a few lobsters are being caught.

Regatta Notes.

Stock is going up on the amateurs in the Guard and a good contest is sure to be the outcome.

The Outer Cove fishermen had their first spin last evening in the Guard which boat they will row on Regatta Day.

The Nellie R. was put in the water last night. She will be left out until Monday, then the finishing touches for Wednesday next will be given her.

The Trade race is causing more interest than any other one on the programme.

There will be five boats in the laborers race.

To-night the Regatta Committee will meet at the T. A. Armoury when all crews must enter.

Post Office Order Rates

We notice that the Bank rate of exchange has advanced in consequence of the War scare from 4.39 to 4.93. This will seriously handicap trade while it lasts. In the meantime it should be remembered that there is no change on the rate of Post Office Orders. From say £40 upwards the rate is about 4.93 as against the Bank rate of 4.93.

The difference may be seen from the following comparison:—
£40 Bank rate \$199.20. Postal Order rate \$196.82.
£100 Bank rate \$498.00. Postal Order rate \$491.55.
£200 Bank rate \$996.00. Postal Order rate \$983.10.
£1,000 Bank rate \$4,980.00. Postal Order rate \$4,915.42.
A considerable saving may thus be effected by remitting by Post Office Order.
