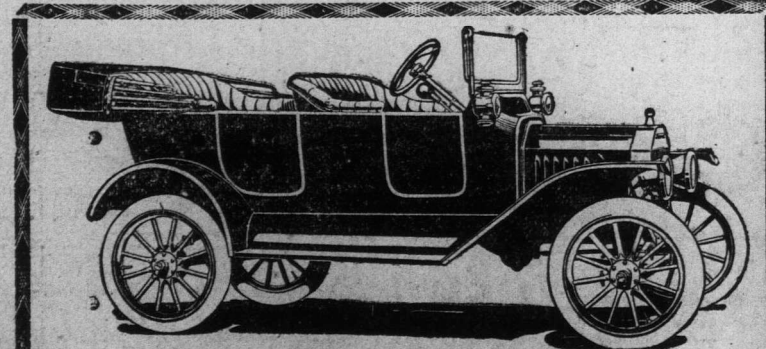

Asquith Goes to Dublin.

It will be most deplorable if the Sinn Féin rebellion is to have an aftermath of debate of an acrimonious character, which can only have the effect of inflaming passion and obscuring the dictates of common sense. The Sinn Féin rebellion has proved abortive, but it involved much loss of life and limb. The leaders deserve punishment and exemplary punishment. But justice should be seasoned with mercy, and that mercy should be extended without stint to those whom the leaders of the revolt misled and the German instigators left to their fate. Harshness and ruthless severity can only excite sympathy among those who have held aloof from methods of force and adhered sensibly to the constitutional politics of John Redmond. It is essential however to disarm thoroughly the adherents of the policy of force. This is all the easier as the rebellion has been put down, and the uselessness of resistance and overt resort to arms demonstrated fully to the most reluctant to believe it. The obvious policy is to make the Sinn Féin and impassioned between those who are enemies of the British flag and those who are loyal to it, and to bring together the latter no matter whether they are Redmondites or Carsonites, no matter whether they dwell in the North, South, East or West of Ireland, or whether they are Green or Orange. The golden opportunity offers for a reconciliation of all who are ready to adhere to constitutional methods. Inflammatory speeches and poisonous retorts cannot do this. Inflammatory speeches will estrange those whose co-operation are needed for the immediate present and the near future. Poison will fester the wounds and keep the body politic sick. In more than one crisis Premier Asquith has acted with firmness, boldness and decision, and it is to be hoped that his visit to Ireland to study the situation on the spot and to handle the situation rationally will lead to a reconciliation of those who have been too long apart, and whose differences have led to a disunited Ireland and made possible an atmosphere in which the sedition of the Sinn Féiners could thrive sufficiently to cause the rebellion, which broke out in Easter week.

Daylight Saving Scheme

Seemingly the Daylight Saving Scheme, introduced by Hon. John Anderson, is growing in popularity and public sentiment is strongly in favor of it. To-day the Board of Trade are discussing the subject with a view to having it enforced here this summer. The Municipal Board are also enthusiastically interested and will discuss the question fully at their regular meeting next Thursday night.

Harness That Didn't Fit

AN AMUSING CASE.
The Society for the Protection of Cruelty to Animals, through Inspector Bastow, summoned to court to-day Truckman Andrew Rice, who was charged with a violation of the Cruelty to Animals Act. The nature of the breach was that Rice had used on his pony while doing a certain work the harness of his big horse. After several witnesses were examined, Mr. Higgins, Counsel for the defendant, arguing on the case, stated that whilst it was true the horse's "clothes" were used on the pony, contended that it was not the serious intention of the S.P.C.A. to go to such trivial extremes to look for convictions under the Act. He admitted that Rice's pony in its fit-to-see turnout was not in an attractive condition to be photographed, but pointed out strongly that the pony was under no cruel treatment; adding that he (Higgins) then had on a collar around his neck that was too large for him, but nevertheless he felt quite comfortable and was not undergoing any extraordinary or cruel ordeal. Mr. Hutchings, J.P., dismissed the case. Mr. Fox acted for the S.P.C.A.

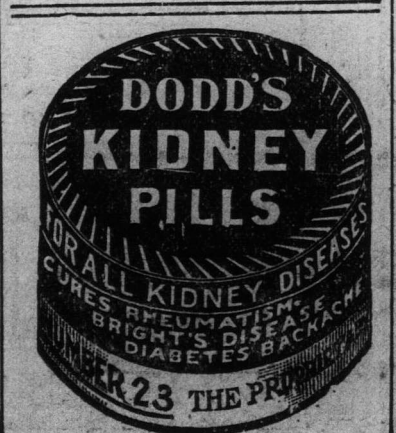

As soon as she finishes discharging her salt cargo, the Donaldson Liner Cranley, will go from here to Heart's Content, the new winter port of the A.N.D. On her next return the Cranley will be able to go to Botwood to load as by that time the ice around the northern port will have disappeared. The Cranley leaves here on Thursday next and will bring along a crowd of men to load the ship at Heart's Content.

Convicted of Larceny.

Four boys whose ages ranged from 12 to 16 years were before court this morning charged with the larceny of a boat, a watch, 40 lbs. of lead and a small quantity of tobacco, soap, tea and sugar. All were convicted. One was let go on suspended sentence, only one larceny having been proven against him. Another was fined \$5 for 14 days. The Olympic Games

The Olympic Games flourished in Greece away back before Senator Shelby Cullom went into politics and were revived in 1896, when it seemed likely that the millennium would soon come unless something new was discovered for the nations to quarrel about.

The first modern games were held in Athens in 1896 and were disappointingly peaceful, but since then the ill-feeling has grown rapidly until at the London games in 1908, several English editors burst while trying to be polite and hostile at the same time.

In the original Olympic games the best athletes of Greece took part and the winners got laurel wreaths for their efforts. Now the nations of the world participate and the prize list has been considerably improved. The winners get laurel wreaths, medals, cups, trophies, moving-picture percentages, magazine rights, vaudeville engagements and half the gate receipts at Madison Park the next winter. Many a poor boy has gone to the Olympic games with only a good pair of legs and a return ticket and has had to leave his laurel wreath behind when returning to make room in his suit case for his exhibition contracts.

The Olympic games consist of sprinting, running, jumping, discus hurling, weight throwing, and whatever other events the entertaining nation has the best chance to win. In England in 1908 they worked in tennis, archery, croquet and tea drinking. Even at that the Americans won the cup and the entente cordiale hasn't been so severely jarred since John Paul Jones sailed up the English Channel.

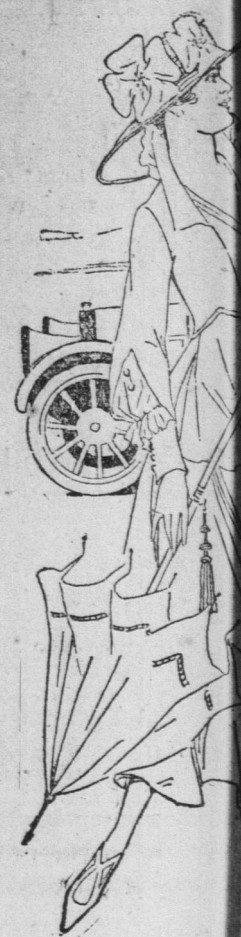
The greatest event of the Olympic games is the Marathon, which is a foot race of twenty-six miles and some hundred yards, the original winner having died at this distance. The 1908 Marathon was won by Johnny Hayes of America, who beat all the British champions, thus demonstrating that since 1776 the Americans have learned to run and the British have forgotten how.

The Olympic games are held once in every four years, it taking quite length of time to ally the ill-feeling over the last event. The games of 1912 were held in Sweden, and as usual, it was the world against the United States with the British newspapers politely aspersing the table manners and tack etiquette of the Yankee victors. America took third place this time in the Marathon.
